The first annual meeting of the Industrial Manufacturing Company was held in the City Court room last night. The meeting was called to order and, on motion, Mr. Jacob S. Allen was called to the chair and Mr. E. F. Johnson appointed secretary.

Messrs. J. T. Riley and O. M. Fillyaw having been appointed a committee to ascertain the number of shares represented, reported 617 shares, which being a majority of the stock, the meeting was declared duly organized.

We gather from yesterday's Ral eigh Chronicle the following partie ulars relative to the death of Willie London, son of Capt. W. L. London, of Pittsboro:

The remains of Mr. Will L. London. who was drowned at Normandy, Tenn., last Friday, arrived in this city on Sunday morning, and were taken from here to his home in Pittsboro by special train. The remains were accompanied to this place by Rev. Telfair Hodgson, Dean of Sewannee University, of which Mr. London was a ministerial student. A' number of friends went from here to Pittsboro on the special

The funeral services were held at that place on Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, conducted by Rev. Wm. Walker and Rev. Mr. Hodgson, and were attended by a very large gathering of friends and acquaintances. The full particulars of the sad death may never be known.
