The wide awake, correspondent of the Charleston News and Courier, at Washington City, seems to think that there is little doubt, that the Force bill will pass the Senate. We had hoped differently but drift of opinion now seems to the effect that the bill will pass the upper, as well as the lower House. Senator Ransom is reported as having taken the views of the members on the question and finding, as a result that the bill will pass. The remarks of the correspondent alluded to above certainly trend in that direction. He says, in a special dated on the 6th inst: "The fate of the Federal election bill in the Senate is still a live topic of conversation, and the comments upon it are more speculative than otherwise. Among the few Republican Congressmen who remained in Washington over the Fourth of July was Mr. Rowell, of Illinois, who played an important part in framing the bill. He asserts, with apparent confidence, that the bill will pass the Senate, substantially as it passed the House, and he discredits its rumors of postponing the bill until next session. This matter, says he, is not a new one. Neither Speaker Reed nor any one man in the Republican party is alone responsible for the bill. The question of enforcing the constitutional provisions with regard to the rights of American citizens to vote and have their votes counted has been fully considered by Republicans in both branches of Congress. It is hardly probable that, after the House has passed upon this subject, in deference to the wishes of a majority of the Republican party, the Senate will consent to any unnecessary delay on the part of the Democratic minority.

"Mr. McComas, who was also actively interested in the preparation of the bill, agrees with Mr. Rowell that it is not likely that the Senate will allow the bill to be postponed until next winter. He says that it is unfair to Speaker Reed to lay all the blame for the passage of the bill upon his shoulders. He simply carried out the wishes of his party, and every detail that came out in the recent debate in the House was anticipated in caucus. Even the engrossment of the bill prior to its passage was suggested in caucus, although Speaker Reed alone gets the credit for that piece of foresightedness. Every emergency that was likely to arise was considered, and efforts were made to guard against any line of tactics the opposition might employ. Mr. McComas does not hesitate to say that the bill is a party measure, and will be so considered by the Senate. The fact that Senator Spooner, of Wisconsin, who is to manage the bill in the Senate, has been called suddenly back to Washington, gives rise to the belief that prompt action may be expected.

"In conservative circles it is conceded that the Republican programme was mapped out with the advent of the present Administration, and it is proposed to carry it out in spite of all opposition. It is a desperate game the Administration is playing, and the majority in Congress appear to be willing to stake everything on the result. Personal feelings, local pledges and in some cases many instincts have been sacrificed at the crack of the party whip, and there is but little hope that the Republicans in the Senate will stop at anything calculated to help their party and maintain the control of the Government. This opinion is shared by many of the leading Democrats in both Houses, and they can do nothing but protest. The majority have the power in their own hands if they see fit to exercise it, and judging from their recent action with regard to the

express purpose of retaining party supremacy. The Chancellors, the Hoars, the Spooners, the Edmundses and others of that stripe in the Senate will hardly allow the opportunity to go unimproved."
