The peach, apple and pear crops in Atlantic county, N. J., will be a complete failure this year and there will not be one-half the usual yield of berries.

The Louisiana Legislature claims that Gov. Nichols' vote of the Lottery Bill is unconstitutional. The situation is further complicated by the fact that one of the pro-lottery Senators died on Thursday afternoon, leaving the Senate with just one less than the two-thirds necessary to override the veto.

The Republican Senators have had their caucus on the Force bill and no decisive result has sprung from it. They talked the thing over on Thursday night. It continued three hours and the Herald report says that the debate was chiefly devoted to the Election bill and how it would be pushed through; but to use the language of a Western Senator, "We could find no way to get around the rules; they stand squarely in the way and block us." A majority of those present were in favor of giving the Election bill the right of way. The feeling manifested against any change in the existing rules was so strong that there was no decided stand taken in favor of amending or altering them; at least such a policy was not pressed to a vote. It is likely that another caucus will be called at an early date and meantime the Republican leaders will try to agree on the line of policy to be pursued.

The Accident Last Night. What might have been a very serious accident occurred last night on the Seacoast Railroad at the crossing of the W. O. & E. C. R. R., at the Mineral Springs, one mile East of the city. There were three coaches filled with passengers on the train which approached the city at 10:30 o'clock. Engineer Wood slowed up on approaching the crossing and without any warning the engine, as it touched the frog there, jumped the track. The air-brakes were at once applied and the disaster was happily averted. The engine and tender were all that left the track and not one of the passengers was injured, although Engineer Wood received some painful but not severe injuries, and the fireman was also hurt, though slightly. An examination showed that some scum had driven a piece of iron between the lips of the frog and thus caused the disaster. If caught, he should be hung. The passengers were all conveyed to town by means of carriages and to-day the road is all right and open to traffic as usual. The tender is in the ditch but never, and the engine will have to be invalidated for awhile.

C. From Conway, S. C., three lines diverge, to Georgetown and Charleston, S. C., another to Salisbury, N. C., via Marion, Bennettsville, Rockingham, Little Mills and Albemarle. The third to Greenville, S. C., via Florence, Camden, Winnsborough and Union.

"The road will have excellent railroad connections with the leading roads of North and South Carolina without paralleling any. The Cape Fear & Cincinnati Railroad as proposed will prove of great advantage to this section, and will aid materially in the development of a country now without communication, and when completed would command plenty of business. To Brunswick county and Southport this road would be of great value and its building will be looked forward to with great interest. Col. Morton, manager of the Cape Fear & Cincinnati Railroad, assures us that the work will soon be started upon the construction of the road."
