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

The French Government is collectthe statistics on the labor question through its representatives all over the world. Mr. Ribot, the minister under whose direction the inquiries are being made, has various plans for the amelioration of the laboring classes at home and wants this detailed information to aid him, in intelligently developing his ideas. He therefore wants to know all about the general condition of working. men everywhere. His inquiries cover their number, wages, political, social and moral condition; the relation of wages to cost of production; the prices of the nececessaries of life; protective measures; state interference in labor disputes; length of working day, school and a number of other details. In the German Reichstag, the other day, in the committee upon the bill proposing an increase in the army, Herr Richter, the Radical leader, maintained that the proposed measures would have to be compensated for by at least the reduction of the term of service to two years. Commissioner Major Caede, in reporting on the Russian army, gave the following figures relating to the strength of the Continental armies. He said that, according to the plan of the mobilization for 1889, the Russian army on a war footing, was 2,579,000; that of Germany was only 2,800,000 or 2,900,000 including 177,680 drilled reserve men; that of France was 3,226,000 and 174,000 drilled reserve men. It is quite certain that Germany had 200,000 or 300,000 men fewer than France. The army of Austria Hungary had a war footing of 1,150,000 and that of Italy 1,030,000, so that the Triple Alliance Powers have 5,140,000 in all, against the 5,805,000 of Russia and Francethat is, about 660,000 men fewer. Baron Von Maltzhan, secretary of the treasury, estimates the present extra demand at about 34,000,000 marks, which will rise later to a least 60,000,000, including 10,000,000 for invalided men.

New York Herald's Washington correspondence: A conference of Republican Senators will probably be held on Thursday or Friday evening next to consider what action they shall take regarding the Federal Election bill. The members of the Finance Committee are anxious that the Tariff bill shall first be disposed of and let the election measare take its chances later on. There is absolutely no truth in the report that an understanding has been reached between the two parties whereby the Force bill will be laid over until next session. Leading Democrats say that if the matter comes to a vote every Republican in the Senate will come into line to the support of the bill. They do not, however, propose that it shall come to a vote.
