There was a heavy thunder storm here last night and a fine rain. The electrical display was magnificent—for any one who didn't happen to be out in the storm.

Heard a Pistol Shot.
It seems, after all, that there is some reason to think that Mr. Falls was murdered on the turnpike between the two gates. It has been rumored that blood has been found on the bridge across the branch opposite Mr. Tom Edens' place but we cannot locate it. Two parties say they heard a pistol-shot and that it appeared to come from the direction of the hill just this side of the branch, about 9 o'clock, or a little later. Dr. Burbank met Mr. Falls on the road near the two-mile post on the evening in question, and if the present supposition is correct the old gentleman was then not more than a half-mile from the scene of his death. The scoundrel got nothing but the \$7 in money as there was nothing else on Mr. Falls' body to take, even his pocket-knife having been left at home on his last and fateful trip to the city.

No Five Thousand-Mile Ticket.
The commercial travellers throughout the South, through the Southern Travellers' Association, have for some time been urging upon the passenger agents of the various Southern railway lines the adoption of a five thousand mile passenger ticket, to be sold to commercial travellers by the various railway systems of this section. The committees of the Southern Travellers' Association were before the rate committee of the Southern Passenger Association a number of times recently to urge the adoption of this ticket. The managing officers have just voted upon the question, and are unanimous in their opposition to the proposed change. Not one vote was cast in favor of the five thousand-mile ticket, though a few scattering were cast in favor of some slight concessions to the travelling men by some of the great railway systems.
