Notwithstanding the deplorable weather the glove contest took place last night at Wrightsville Beach, as advertised, although the fun did not begin until nearly 9 o'clock. Messrs. Let us remark here, *en passant*, that the idea entertained by some that this is a brutal exhibition is entirely erroneous. The men do not fight; they spar. Their hands are clothed in heavy gloves, thickly padded, they do not lose their tempers but give and take, with perfect good humor and the exhibition is simply a scientific one. In many of the high schools of the country it is a part of the gymnastic training. It is simply a display of the science of self-defense, something that every boy should be taught. If this were so, and men were taught to rely upon their muscles and their skill, there would be fewer pistols worn in this country and much less blood shed in street brawls.
