The New Election Law.

The new election law, under which a new registration is ordered in New Hanover county, is an important one. No registration shall be valid unless it specifies as near as may be mocks. It is probable that Prof. the age, occupation, place of birth and place of residence of the elector, as well as the township or county from whence the elector has removed-in the event of a removal-and the full name by which the voter is

The registration books are to be open for inspection and challenge on the second Saturday preceding

the election.

Section 2681 is amended to read: Upon the request of any elector the registrar shall require an applicant (for registration) to prove his identity, or age and residence by such testimony under oath as may be satisfactory to the registrar. The registrar shall record the name, age, occupation, place of birth and place of residence of the elector, and the name of the township or county from which the elector has removed-in the event of a removal - also the date of registration, in the appropriate column of the registration book, Section 2682 is amended so that the registrar is to put on his book on the day of election any becoming of ago since the books were closed, provided he be found otherwise en titled to vote. Section 2688 is amended as follows: Each box is to be labelled in plain and distinct Roman letters with the name of the office or offices to be voted for. The majority of the judges of election for the county and State offices may rail off a space or enclosure as a polling place to hold the election for State and county offices. Only one voter shall be allowed to enter at a time and no one but the judges of election shall be allowed to speak to him or interfere with him while casting his vote, which shall be put voter himself and by the judges at the request of the voter. 


