## The State Pension List.

**The last Legislature made an appropriation for pensions amounting in the aggregate to about \$80,000, which has been collected. The beneficiaries under the act are ex-Confederate soldiers and the widows of such. For several years the amount paid out for pensions has been small, there being an appropriation of \$30,000. Last year there were 4,000 pensioners. Application blanks were sent out by Auditor Sanderlin on the first of last March and the law requires them to be filled up and returned not later than August 4th. It is now said that about one thousand applications have not been returned, and as the Auditor has no authority to extend the time, it may work great hardship in many instances. Official notice was given in this county to those entitled to the pension to file their papers.**

## He Was Not There.

**Sam Jones was to have been present at a great camp-meeting of the Southern Methodists at Wesley Grove, as is announced in a telegram from Baltimore to the Charleston World, but he was not there. The special says:**

**"Some months ago a committee of officials invited Mr. Jones to attend the meeting. Arrangements progressed satisfactorily, and many came expressly to hear the celebrated evangelist. However, he was not present, as a powerful clique of clergymen headed by Bishop Alpheus W. Wilson, and including such men as Rogers, Gough and Wishner, of the Baltimore conference, strongly opposed the coming of the revivalist. They succeeded in preventing it.**

**"Sam Jones' friends charge that his enemies, including the bishop, were actuated by jealousy, and are envious of the overshadowing influence of the evangelist. The clique asserts in defense that they are opposed to Jones' methods. The result has brought about much bitterness."**

## The Veterans and the Flag.

**About 25 Confederate veterans paraded yesterday in front of the Orton House and to the step of a kettle drum marched to Front street depot, where they boarded the 5 o'clock train for Camp Latimer. Col. John D. Taylor was in command. It was a wet trip. At Wrightsville they rode to the encampment and were there cordially greeted. There was no parade but they were most cordially welcomed at the camp and handsomely entertained. They carried with them two flags, the Federal flag and the battle scarred banner of Latham's artillery. This flag, by the way, has a history. At Appomattox, when the surrender was imminent, Capt. Flanner cut the flag from its staff and concealed it under his clothes, next to his body, and in this manner brought it home. It is in the personal keeping of the President of the Ladies' Memorial Association and only sees the light on Memorial Day and such occasions as was yesterday. It was a comparatively new flag, the old one having been shot to pieces in the various engagements in which the battery participated. It has inscribed upon its folds the name of every battle in which the command was engaged.**
