To Bore an Artesian Well.
Under this heading the Charlotte Chronicle says: W. E. Worth, of the firm of W. E. Worth & Co., ice manufacturers, of Wilmington and Goldsboro, N. C., and Petersburg, Va., was in the city yesterday, and secured an option on the property of Col. J. T. Anthony, at the corner of Fifth and A streets, and will begin at once to bore an artesian well to obtain a supply of water to operate a 25 ton ice machine, which he will erect thereon.

On to Atlanta.
Capt. T. W. Whitsant, Superintendent of the Carolina Central Railroad, received a telegram to-day from Capt. J. A. Dobson, Superintendent of the Georgia, Carolina and Northern Railroad, stating that two miles of track were laid on that road yesterday; that the working force was at that time within two miles of Clinton, S. C., and that they would pass through that town with the track to-morrow. We understand also that nearly two and a half miles of the track was laid on Saturday.

Clinton is about one hundred miles South of Monroe and the schedule of the trains will be extended to that point in a few days.

The Board of Audit and Finance at their meeting yesterday audited and approved bills for current expenses amounting to \$235.40. No action was taken in regard to the proposed purchase of a fire alarm plant. All the members of the Board were present with the exception of Capt. W. R. Kenan.

The Knights of Pythias Day.
A large crowd is expected. They will come from Fayetteville, Bennettsville, Gibson and other points. The first arrivals will be over the C. E. & Y. V. R. R. They will be met at Point Peter by the lodges here and welcomed by Mr. Iredell Meares. They will all then go direct to Carolina Beach where they will be joined by another party of Knights arriving here at 3 p. m.

The County Poor House.
Through the courtesy of Mr. B. R. King, the efficient Superintendent of the County Poor House and the House of Correction, we were permitted to visit that institution this morning and make some brief notes of what we saw there for publication.

The new building, now in course of construction, is of brick, and occupies the site of the wooden structure which was burned. The main building is two stories high, contains twelve well ventilated and well lighted rooms, and will be occupied by the superintendent and his family. This is connected with two wings, one story high, each containing nine rooms and a dining room; that on the South being for white females, and that on the North for white males. The rooms are all large, well ventilated and well lighted, with a fire place in each room. The sides of the rooms are plastered, while overhead they are ceiled with corrugated iron. A broad piazza extends around the entire structure. Just North of the North wing is the insane department, a one story brick building, with nine fine rooms, well lighted and ventilated and the windows well secured by strong iron gratings. A broad piazza extends the entire length of the front of the building where patients may take exercise in the open air. Just East of the insane department are the quarters to be used by colored people, arranged with the same regard to health, comfort and convenience as are those of the whites. The kitchen and laundry are immediately in the rear of the main building, and so located that all can be served with meals at the least possible trouble. It will be fitted up with the most approved style of cooking ranges and every modern appliance for convenience and economy. In rear of the kitchen is the hospital, with wards for eight patients, besides the room to be occupied by the matron.

The plan of situation for the different departments, we understand, originated with Mr. H. A. Bagg, the efficient chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, who has, ever since he has been in office, taken a deep interest in the poor of the county. Mr. B. R. King, the Superintendent, keeps a watchful eye for the welfare of those placed under his charge, as well as for the best interests of the county, to whom he is accountable. There are at present eighteen inmates in the poor department, and four who are held as prisoners by sentence of the Criminal Court. Four of the inmates are white and the others are colored. The food is a plain, wholesome and substantial diet, of flour, meal, hominy, vegetables and meat, such as almost any one would eat with a relish. We conversed with a number of the inmates and they all testify to the uniform kindness and care of the superintendent and declared that they were better off than before they came there, which, after a careful survey of the surroundings, we fully believed. THOMASVILLE, N. C.
The Baptist Orphanage—New Railroads—A Fine Country—Magnificent Crops—Politics at White Heat—Predictions of some Democratic Victorics.

A friend at Thomasville, writing under date of the 15th inst., sends us a very interesting letter from that section of the State. He says:

"Your readers may be interested in the Baptist Orphanage at this place, under the skillful management of that old pioneer, Mr. J. H. Mills, who, as you know, was the founder of the Oxford Orphan Asylum. At this time there are 125 girls and boys at this institution. Two weeks ago they had their annual commencement, which was very largely attended by persons from various parts of the State. It is located on a most beautiful spot, and will make one of the loveliest places in the State in the course of a few more years. Instead of two large buildings, as at Oxford, Mr. Mills, seeing the disadvantage of having so large a number together, has built several small cottages, which shows his sound wisdom. These cottages resemble some of the mountain watering places. They are located upon high, rolling ground, being only one foot lower than High Point, on the N. C. R. R., which is 1,000 feet above the sea level. As a summer resort Thomasville cannot be surpassed, though as yet but few come from the eastern part of the State. There are two hotels. The Sullivan, where I am stopping, is admirably kept by Mr. J. T. Grimes, and I am told the other is also very well kept.

THE THOMASVILLE, SILVER VALLEY AND PEEDEE R. R.

"The engineer corps have just completed their survey from this place to Wadesboro, a distance of 75 miles, and also from here to Winston, a distance of 22 1/2 miles.

"The engineers are now computing the estimate of the cost of this road, which will be of great benefit to your 'City by the Sea,' passing through a portion of the finest agricultural and mineral sections of the State. Along the Yadkin and Pee Dee rivers the most beautiful scenery will be had for the traveling public, which cannot be surpassed by any section of the State. It is the finest water power by long odds in North Carolina, and in ten or fifteen years the Yadkin and Pee Dee rivers will be a second Lowell. The president of this road, Mr. J. T. Cranmer, says that the road will most assuredly be built, and as soon as he can submit his estimate of the cost he can command the necessary capital to build and equip it. The road can be built at a comparatively small expense. The people along the entire line are anxious for it, with one or two exceptions, which is always the case.

THE CROPS.
"The crops through Anson, Richmond, Stanley, Montgomery and Davidson are just superb, and also between this place and Winston, through Davidson and Forsythe counties.
