Instead of two large buildings, as at Oxford, Mr. Mills, seeing the disadvantage of having so large a number together, has built several small cottages, which shows his sound wisdom. These cottages resemble some of the mountain watering places. They are located upon high, rolling ground, being only one foot lower than High Point, on the N. C. R. R., which is 1,000 feet above the sea level. As a summer resort Thomasville cannot be surpassed, though as yet but few come from the eastern part of the John H. Farrar. Poll-holders, B. State.
