All Kansas is divided into 106 counties. Of these thirty-seven report empty jails and forty-four report "no paupers in the county."

Attention is called by the Kansas City Times to the fact that not a Democratic Convention held in the West this year has failed to say good things about Ex-President Cleveland.

The color line is drawn in Nova Scotia restaurants. A colored clergyman of Halifax has sued the proprietor of the railroad restaurant at Amherst, N. S., for refusing to allow him to sit down at the same table with white folk.

The body of the Queen of Corea, who died June 4, is still kept in brine, the process of embalming being unknown to the people of that far-off land. The body will be kept four or five months, according to the custom of the country, and then interred with much pomp and ceremony.

The largest chime in the country will be placed in the north tower of St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York city. The aggregate weight of the fifteen bells, gauged to fifteen tones, will be 30,000 pounds, and they will merrily swing 180 feet from the street on every Sunday morning.

A Savannah correspondent writes to the Atlanta Constitution: "Mayor Ryal's gross receipts from his 125-acre truck farm have averaged over \$18,000 a year for the past nine years, and he nets—well, in 1880 he was \$2,000 or \$3,000 in debt, while now he is worth more than \$60,000, every dollar of it made on the farm."

Guiana is reported to be rapidly increasing its output of gold. The statement of shipments shows that, whereas, prior to 1886, less than one thousand ounces were shipped annually, the shipments have been increased from 6,518 ounces in the year named to 29,327 ounces in 1889, and for six months of the present year the yield has been 25,000 ounces.

"Less than half the amount of woollen machinery running in Berkshire county fifteen years ago is now in operation," says the Springfield Republican, "and three-fourths of the woollen manufacturers have failed in twenty years—this is the way the wool tariff has worked up there, according to our Pittsfield correspondent. At this rate the McKinley bill would give the industry a finishing stroke by the year 1900."

It is one hundred years since cotton spinning was put into successful operation in America by young Samuel Slater, and as Pawtucket, R. I., was the theatre of his successful experiments, it is proposed to celebrate this cotton centenary there in the last days of next September and the first days of October by speeches, processions, popular sports and an industrial exposition.

One of the men who wastes time in unprofitable figuring makes the following estimate of the effect of the present railroad strike in New York: The aggregate capitalization of 175 active stocks, at the very moderate estimate of \$30,000,000 each, is \$5,250,000,000; the average decline following the strike has been 3 per cent; net apparent loss, \$157,500,000. Vice President Webb estimates the company's loss by the strike at \$250,000.

Gen. Bragg is quite hopeful that he will be nominated for Congress by the Democrats of the 3d Wisconsin district. The General is reported to be in a phenomenally "sunburned condition," suggestive that he has been travelling about the district somewhat, renewing his acquaintance with his friends among the people. In the General's district a nomination by the Democratic party is a sure forerunner of election by the people.

## The Census Returns.

The official count for this district has been made up by the Census Bureau and was sent out last night in the press dispatches. There are 13 counties in the district and the population of each is given as follows:

There are several apparent absurdities in this. In the first place the population of New Hanover county outside of Wilmington is placed at 3,919, while the increase is 2,551, against an increase of 2,658 in the city. How this can be it would take a Philadelphia lawyer to determine Wilmington is a part of the county yet the increase in the city is larger than that of the entire county, of which it proves a part. These figures can be correct only on the supposition that New Hanover county, outside of the city, has actually decreased in population, a proposition which we do not for one moment believe. On the contrary, there is every reason to believe that there has been an increase in the country townships, as well as in the city.

## Sudden Death.

Mr. A. G. McGirt, the auctioneer, a well-known resident of this city, died suddenly at his residence here, No. 110 South Sixth street, at 5.25 o'clock this morning. He was sick but a few hours. He first complained yesterday and was on the streets during the afternoon. He took to bed last evening and died as we have stated, this morning, of some heart trouble, aggravated by congestion of the liver. The funeral services will take place this afternoon and the interment will be in Oakdale.

Mr. McGirt was a native of Robeson county but he has been a resident of this city for many years. He was 48 years of age, and he leaves a wife and four children. He was a member of Orion Lodge No. 67, I. O. O. F., Stonewall Lodge No. 1, K. of P., and Wilmington Lodge No. 319, A. F. and A. M. He was a veteran of Co. D, 46th N. C. Regiment and a gallant Confederate soldier.
