A change of schedule on the Seacoast Railroad goes into effect on Monday next. This train will lie over at Princess street.

The Mayor's Report.
We have received from His Honor Mayor Fowler, a copy of his annual report as recently submitted to the Board of Aldermen. It briefly covers all essential points and connected with it is the statement of the Mr. W. A. Willson, City Clerk and Treasurer, showing the exact financial condition of the city at this time.

The Mayor says that during the past twelve months there have been 207 buildings constructed here at an approximate value of \$310,000. In the number were 106 residences. All obligations of the city, he says, are promptly met and the sinking fund for the eventual liquidation of the bonded debt is strictly maintained. The bonds command a premium of from 3 to 5 per cent and are eagerly sought.

The sanitary condition is good. The Mayor estimates the population at 10,000 white and 15,000 colored, and finds from the returns that the mortality among the whites is but 11.30 in the thousand and among the blacks 18.70. He directs attention to a former report made by him relative to the necessity for a system of public sewers and the establishment of a quarantine station at the mouth of the river.

He refers to the substantial improvements which have been made on the roadways in the city and thinks that Princess street, from Front to Second, should be paved at once with blocks and that Nutt street should wait on Princess. Let us say here that in our opinion Princess should wait on Nutt and that it is useless to pave the former at all unless the work is carried to Third street and we do not think that the city is in a condition to pay for the work and that on Nutt street as well just at this time.

The Mayor calls attention to the condition of the central and suburban streets, a work in which the REVIEW has been fruitlessly engaged for years past. He thinks they should be ballasted with crushed rock, obtained from quarries East of the city. This is a more important work than the paving of Princess street.

More docks are needed, and the Mayor recommends that the dock at the foot of Chestnut street be opened and the wharf repaired, and it should be done.

His Honor recommends that the Western part of Front Street Market be converted into a fish market; that the stand pipe of the Water Works Co. be removed from Hilton to a central or southerly location and that the members of the police force be appointed by a commission to be appointed by the legislature.

In the City Court during the year 1,621 cases were disposed of and the receipts therefrom, converted into the treasury, were \$3,685.95.

The Mayor compliments the Fire Department, states that negotiations are now under way by which a park 30 acres in extent can be secured and closes by recommending that the laws relative to the city be revised and codified and the result submitted to the legislature for its approval.

The City Treasurer's report shows that the receipts from all causes during the year have been \$153,186.76 and the expenditures \$140,924.32, leaving a balance on hand in cash of \$10,582.20. The total bonded debt of the city is \$709,800 and the floating debt \$12,574.34. From this last the cash on hand is to be deducted, leaving an actual deficit of \$1,992.14, which is \$311.92 in excess of the deficit of the previous year. It is proper to state that the bonds issued, and to be issued, to the W. O. & E. C. R. R. are not included in the above and the bonded debt of the city is therefore practically \$809,800 instead of \$709,800.

From the mass of items we figure out that the actual running expenses of the city during the year have been \$113,575.49, which on the basis of the population assumed by the Mayor, 25,000, is \$4.54 for every man, woman and child in the city.

The Lawyers and the Courts.
Some of our lawyers are "betwixt the devil and the deep sea." Brunswick and Pender courts both convene next week and they will be obliged to attend both. Hon. A. M. Waddell and Messrs. Marsden Bellamy, A. G. Ricard and Iredell Meares will go down to Southport on Monday and Messrs. DuBrutz Cutlar and H. McClammy will attend Pender court on the same day. On Wednesday Messrs. Bellamy and Ricard will go up from Southport to Burgaw.

After Many Years.
Rev. R. H. Jones, of Norfolk, Va., who is to preach in St. James's Church to-morrow morning and at St. Mark's at night, is not altogether a stranger here. He was located in this city nearly half a century ago. He was then a minister in the Methodist Protestant Church, from which he soon seceded and entered the Episcopal Church. Forty-two years ago he united Mr. A. J. Yopp and his wife in the bonds of matrimony. Mr. Yopp had a visit from him this morning at the store of his son, Mr. W. H. Yopp, on South Front street, on which occasion Mr. Jones spoke in the warmest terms of our city and our people, referring to the pleasant days of his sojourn in our midst.
