

The only State that has been absolutely uniform in its Congressional representation is Rhode Island. It had two members under the first census and the same number ever since. It is bound to remain in the same category another ten years. Its population in 1880 was 276,531, and it is now 328,000. There is a variation which precludes change, what ever basis of representation may be adopted. Delaware has always had just one, except that under the third census it had two. These are the

only constant quantities in the entire category.

ton from rust and shedding.


Death of Dr. Saunders.
