LOCAL NEWS.

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The Falls of Niagara carry down 10,000,000 cubic feet of water per minute, equal to about 3,000,000 horse power.

Miss Rose Elizabeth Cleveland, sister of ex President Cleveland, has sailed for Europe and will spend some time abroad.

The flees have descended upon Harlem, N. Y., and they are so bad that the health board has been asked to take steps for the relief of the citizens.

Joseph Pulitzer, of the New York World, who has become totally blind, has for private secretary a young Englishman named Ponsonby, who is a nephew of Lord Ponsonby.

The oldest Sister of Mercy in America is Mother Seton, of the New York Convent of Mercy, who is over 90. Her father died in 1800. Her mother, a convert, founded the Order of the Sisters of Charity at Emmitsburg.

Senator Hampton, of South Carolina, announces that he shall not ask for a reelection to the Senate. He has never asked for an office, he says, and he doesn't think he shall begin asking at this late day. He will accept a reelection, however, if it is offered him.

Prof. Tyndall completed his 70th year on August 30. He is taking his annual holiday, as he has done for many years, with Mrs. Tyndall, in Switzerland, and is in the enjoyment of excellent health. He is a famous Alpine climber, and greatly enjoys life among the glaciers.

Among the incidents of the late Grand Army reunion in Boston was the meeting of two brothers, natives of Maine, who had not seen each other since the war, and each of whom supposed the other to have been killed in that conflict. One now lives in New York, the other in Vermont.

There was a time when lawyers predominated in the race for office, but the Des Moines Leader has discovered that the newspaper men are now coming to the front, there being in Wisconsin two editors on the Republican State ticket and four on the Democratic, while the fifth is a printer by trade.

The prize offered by Harvard University for the most symmetrically formed woman has been won by Miss Best, of Meadville, Pa., out of 3,000 competitors. The worst of Miss Best's triumph is the crop of squibs it is certain to precipitate about its fair winner having bested the rest of womankind.

Mrs. James K. Polk, the widow of President Polk, completed her 87th year last Thursday. She lives on the Polk place, near Nashville, Tenn., and each year the members of the General Assembly go out to pay their respects in a formal and courtly manner at her home. Three years ago Mrs. Cleveland called on her.

In the matter of railways Japan appears to be going ahead tolerably fast. Considerably over one thousand miles are already in operation, while an equal quantity are under construction or surveyed, and will be open within a year or two from now. The projected railways exceed several hundred miles in length with a capital exceeding \$2,000,000 sterling.

Speaking of the recent State elections in Kentucky, Vermont and Arkansas the Providence Journal says: "These uniform Democratic gains and Republican losses are not due wholly or even chiefly to local considerations; indeed, the Republican disaffection is far-spread enough to warrant the affirmation that there is dissatisfaction with the national party organization all over the country, and to suggest the probability of further expressions of apathy and distrust in the elections of the next two months."
