The stranded Steamer. Capt. R. H. Beery, Surveyor for the Record, who went down to the wrecked yacht Mignon on Thursday with Capt. Edgar Williams, in the little tug Laurence, returned to the city yesterday afternoon. He reports that he found the wreck full of water and sand and recommends that she be sold as she lies. Two boats were taken from the yacht and the furnishings were removed and placed on the beach. The Mignon was bought by the Oemler Oyster Company of Savannah, Ga., and was on her way out to that port. She was valued at \$6,000 and insured for \$4,000 in the North American Insurance Company, of Philadelphia.

Two Shots Fired.

A difficulty occurred to-day, about 1 o'clock, between William Stewart and L. Suggs, both colored. Stewart struck Suggs with a piece of board and the latter applied at the City Hall for a warrant for Stewart's arrest, which was issued and placed in the hands of Officer Howland for service. Soon after Suggs met Stewart in a shoe shop on second street, when the latter whipped out a pistol and fired two shots at Suggs. The first time he shot himself in the finger and the next time some one standing near knocked the pistol and the ball struck a colored boy named Horace Adams, who was sitting near by, making a slight wound in the ankle. Officer Howland appeared on the scene at this juncture when Stewart turned upon him and snapped the pistol in his face, whereupon the officer drew his club and struck him across the arm and the pistol fell from his hand. He was then arrested and taken to the guard house. It is a wonder no one was seriously hurt. Stewart fired twice and twice the cartridge failed to explode. He was locked up.

Is it the Star?
The famous "Star of Bethlehem," which heralded the birth of the Saviour and which has reappeared every two or three hundred years since that time, is said by astronomers to be about due now. In 1888 it was expected and marvellous stories went the rounds of the papers as to its brilliancy. Some claim that it can be seen even at midday when the sun is shining.

In the last few months the talk has been revived in some quarters and the curious are said to be looking for its appearance at almost any time.

All this lends some interest to the fact that a beautiful and brilliant star has been seen in the southern heavens the last few nights and the star-gazers are wondering if it is the one. Those who have examined it through a glass describe its appearance as very singular. The star itself seems made of two concentric rings studded with diamonds and there are said to be ten points around the edges.
