Sales of Real Estate.

The Tabernacle.
The Sam Jones tabernacle is now all ready for occupancy with the exception of the electric lights, and these will be put in a day or two. We notice that our morning cotemporaries state that it will seat 7,000 persons. This, according to measurements and estimates made by a friend of ours, is excessive. Our friend finds the seating capacity, even allowing for the aisles full of chairs, at just 5,334, and he thinks that the ushers will do well if they seat 5,000. Still, that is a large number of people to get together at one time. It is equivalent to a brigade of five full regiments.

Lodge, Corner Stone and Band.
Giblem Lodge No. 2, colored Masons, went to Southport to-day on the Sylvan Grove for the purpose of laying the corner stone of Mt. Carmel A. M. E. Church at that place, which was to have been done to-day. They were accompanied by a large number of colored people from this city. The body marched down Market street, preceded by the new Convivial Cornet Band, colored, of 16 pieces, and they discoursed some excellent music.

This band, by the way, is but one year old, having been organized on the 23rd of last September. There are 18 members in all. The leader is Joe Nance and Benj. Williams is the drum major.

Criminal Court.
The September Term of the Criminal Court for New Hanover county convened in the Court House in this city this morning, with His Honor, Judge Meares, on the Bench, and Solicitor Moore appearing for the State. The following were drawn as a grand jury for the term: W. H. Yopp, Foreman; E. T. Coghill, J. A. Stubbs, H. R. Kuhl, Jr., J. E. Humphrey, E. Rehder, Jos. H. Lane, B. J. Bryan, D. J. Brady, C. R. Branch, D. D. Cameron, S. H. Terry. The following cases were disposed of to-day, up to our close:

State vs. Gaston Solomon and Jas. H. Dorsett, for an affray. Verdict guilty. Judgment suspended on payment of costs as to both.

State vs. John A. Barker, for perjury. Motion for removal on affidavit to another county to be heard to-morrow morning.

The grand jury came into court and returned a true bill in the case of John Koch, indicted for murder. A day for the trial of this case will probably be agreed upon this afternoon.

Weekly Weather Crop Bulletin.
The reports of correspondents of the Weekly Weather Crop Bulletin, issued by the North Carolina Experiment Station and State Weather Service, co-operating with the United States Signal Service, show that during the week ending Saturday last the temperature has been considerably above the normal which has been favorable for the maturing of crops. The earlier part of the week was generally clear with but little rain, the latter part cloudy with frequent showers, not sufficient to do much injury except in a few counties as Richmond, Mecklenburg and Rowan. Farmers are chiefly employed in picking cotton and curing the finest crop of tobacco produced in this State for many years. Fodder has been nearly all saved. Wheat land is being prepared and the sowing of oats has commenced.

The Hebrew New Year.
The year 5651 in the Hebrew calendar was ushered in last night and to-day so many places of business have been closed that it looks like Sunday on the streets. Services were held in the Temple of Israel last evening and this morning.

The Hebrew New Year has nothing to do with the Creation. It is not pretended by Hebrews that it is commensurate with the first of the seven days occupied by the Creator in evolving order and life out of chaos. In the command itself it is spoken of as the seventh month. Time is measured in the Hebrew calendar from the new moon, and the extra days are added every seventh year. This makes New Year's Day a movable feast and tends to mix up outsiders who do not comprehend the way the thing is figured. The seventh day is the Sabbath, the seventh month the Sabbatical month, and both are held in high reverence. That is why the opening of the latter is proclaimed with so much solemnity and the day observed as a solemn feast.
