At the meeting of the directors of the Wilmington and Seacoast Building and Loan Association last Wednesday, Col. T. W. Strange was unanimously elected attorney of this association.

The Pawnee, the new steamship of the Clyde line, built for trade with this port, will sail on her first trip from New York on Wednesday. She will leave here on the return trip on the following Tuesday.

We understand that several gentlemen in this city are talking about putting up a large canning factory at Scott's Hill. They propose to keep it going the year round, canning oysters, berries, fruit and vegetables.

Mr. John F. Garrell's stalls, No. 1 and 2, south side, Front street market, showed up with some beautiful mountain beef to-day. He received another carload from Western N. C. to-day and proposes to have tomorrow the finest display of meats seen here in months.

Official announcement has been received here of the appointment of Mr. T. C. Bryan as Assistant General Freight and Passenger Agent, with office at Portsmouth, Va., and Mr. H. W. B. Glover as Division Freight and Passenger Agent, with office at Greenwood, S. C., for the Seaboard Air Line.

Goldsboro Argus: Mr. Pembroke Jones, of Wilmington, who is a member of the syndicate owning and operating the rice mills in this city, was here yesterday, and his many friends were glad, indeed, to see him. He says the Goldsboro Mills will pay the very highest market price for rice this year, as usual.

The Passport is off the ways and went down the river this morning. The Bossie has taken her place at the shipyard.

Yesterday's rains interfered very seriously with the supplies in market to-day. There was plenty of meat but vegetables were very scarce.

Mr. H. Bacon, of the U. S. Engineer Department, returned to the city this morning with his wife, from a visit to relatives at Winchester, Mass.

Coots were in market this morning. There were but few of them and they were not very fat. But the price made up for all other delinquencies. Only 85 cents a dozen.

We have had but one copy of the Charlotte News this week and this is Friday. Wednesday's issue got here last night. Monday's, Tuesday's and Thursday's are yet to be accounted for.

"Almost Certain."

Yesterday's Goldsboro Dispatch says: "Rev. C. L. Arnold, who so acceptably filled the Mission in St. Stephen's Episcopal Church in August, will preach in the same place to-morrow night at 8 o'clock. A large congregation will doubtless greet him. It is now almost certain that Mr. Arnold will be secured as rector of this church at least for one year."

For the State Fair.

Round trip tickets from Wilmington to Raleigh at \$3.20 (including one admission to the State Fair), will be on sale October 12th by the Atlantic Coast Line. Articles intended for exhibition will be transported at regular tariff rates, and if returned by the party exhibiting, (which fact should be established by certificate of the Secretary and by presentation of the original shipping receipt), will be billed free and the amount of freight paid thereon refunded by the agent at the station from which shipped.

More About the Storm.

The storm yesterday was pretty general. The rainfall, which up to 4.30 p. m. was 2.57 inches, as stated by us, rose to 3 1/2 inches in all. No serious damages have been reported. There was a washout on the C. C. R. R. between Phoenix and North-west, which detained the train due here last night an hour and a half. At Southport the Signal Observer reported that the Br. steamship Ethelburga wet ashore about 5 o'clock on the shoals at the upper end of Battery Island. She had just weighed anchor and was turning to go up the river, when she struck. The tug Blanche went to offer assistance. The tide was higher than usual when the steamship went on the shoal, and soon afterwards it began to fall.

The latest information from the steamer is to the effect that she is still there. She did not come off at high water this morning. Anchors have been run out from her and another effort is to be made to float her on the next tide, somewhere about 6 o'clock this afternoon. Many think that she will have call on a tug for help.

LATER—News from below says that the ship got afloat at 4.30 this afternoon, without outside help. Br. steamship Amoor and schr Clytie sailed this afternoon.

THE TABERNACLE.

Service Last Night and This Morning—Mr. Jones Not Here Yet—An Auspicious Beginning.

Rev. Mr. Jones, who was expected last evening on the Carolina Central train at 7.30 did not arrive. It is said that he will surely get here this evening or to-morrow morning at the latest. His assistant, Rev. Geo. L. Stuart, is here, however, as is also Prof. Excell, and notwithstanding the downpour of rain services were held last night in the Tabernacle. Between 700 and 800 people attended this service. The choir, led by Mr. H. M. Bowden, was on hand in large numbers, the accompaniment consisting of an organ, played by Mrs. J. F. Garrell, and a piano, played by Mrs. W. H. Shaw. Rev. Mr. Stuart conducted the service, which was opened by the choir in two hymns. Mr. Stuart's sermon was an excellent one, explaining the purpose of the meeting and requesting the prayers of the congregation for the pastor. Besides Mr. Stuart there were seven other clergymen on the platform, as follows:

At the conclusion of the meeting many of those present crowded around Mr. Stuart and were presented to him. A number of penitents appeared at the stand last night and gave the preacher their hand, promising to lead a better life.

Service was held this morning at 10.30 o'clock, and at 11 o'clock Mr. Stuart preached again. There were about 2,000 persons present this morning, many of them being from points outside of the city. The choir was again in full force this morning and the singing was magnificent. The opening prayer was delivered by Rev. R. E. Peele and the closing prayer by Rev. Dr. Creasy. Mr. Stuart pronounced the benediction. Several persons asked the prayers of the congregation this morning.

Mr. Stuart stated that there will be service again to-night at 7.30 o'clock, a prayer meeting at 6.30 to-morrow morning and preaching at 10.30 and 3 and 7.30 p. m. He also said that Mr. Jones may arrive this afternoon but that, if he does not arrive then, he will surely be here to-morrow morning.

The meetings have opened happily and auspiciously, notwithstanding Mr. Jones' absence and the drawback of the weather last night. The arrangements are all excellent. Those attending are seated quietly and expeditiously. Col. Roger Moore is chief usher. Mr. Preston Cumming is his chief assistant and there are nearly a hundred others to assist these.
