It is reported from Madrid that Cuba is ripe for revolution. The country is almost in a state of anarchy. In the towns commerce is ruined, and public opinion is so discouraged that hope for the future is abandoned, while in the country strong gangs of bandits and sequestrators are described as carrying on a nefarious trade in the most open and barefaced manner. Trains are stated to have been stopped and pillaged, passengers not unfrequently murdered, farms and homesteads burned and their owners sequestered.

The New York correspondent of the Baltimore Sun says: "Mr. Carnegie, in conversation with your correspondent, says there is no doubt of the great interest which the British, German and French iron masters take in the development now going on in the South, because, as he said, it is new. His information is to the effect that at least three-fourths of the foreigners will turn southward from Chicago, though there is a strong movement to switch them off to the Northwest and to Canada. This desire was shown in the institute meeting today when the assistant minister of agriculture of Ontario and a representative of the Dominion, from Ottawa, appeared with personal invitations."

The controversy as to the largest check ever drawn has broken out again in the English newspapers. The Bullionist says that it was a check for £3,250,000, drawn to pay an arbitration award, and the other checks for \$2,000,000, £1,750,000, £1,250,000 and £700,000 are mentioned as in it, all being English checks, except one drawn here by a Vanderbilt. A larger check, however, than any of these, except the first, was drawn in 1881 by President Roberts, of the Pennsylvania Railroad, in payment of \$80 a share for nearly 200,000 shares of Philadelphia, Wilmington and Baltimore Railroad stock, when Mr. Thayer, of Boston, sold the controlling interest "short" to the Baltimore and Ohio, and Bob Garrett "leaked."

The Washington correspondent of the Baltimore Sun says: "The man best qualified to lead the Democratic forces in the House is thought to be Mr. Crisp, of Georgia. He is aggressive, but always dignified, and commands greater respect from his political opponents than any other man on his side of the hall. In his frequent parliamentary 'slugging' bouts with Speaker Reed and the other recognized leaders on the Republican side he has invariably managed to score an equal number of points and at the same time to retain the esteem and admiration of all who have watched his course in Congress. His success as a leader is due to his evenly-balanced temper and his quickness to perceive the strength and character of his adversaries. There are many other able gentlemen on the Democratic side, but many of them who aspire to leadership are apt to lose their tempers at the very moment when calmness and cool-headedness is most desirable."
