The controversy as to the largest check ever drawn has broken out again in the English newspapers. A larger check, however, than any of these, except the first, was drawn in 1881 by President Roberts, of the Pennsylvania Railroad, in payment of \$80 a share for nearly 200,000 shares of Philadelphia, Wilmington and Baltimore Railroad stock, when Mr. Thayer, of Boston, sold the controlling interest "short" to the Baltimore and Ohio, and Bob Garrett "leaked."
