Advancement of the New Railroad.

Yesterday's Newbern Journal says: A party of gentlemen connected with the Onslow railroad were in the city yesterday. They were the contractor, Mr. Thos. A. McIntyre, of New York, the general manager, Mr. H. A. Whiting, of Wilmington, and Messrs. Henry E. Knox and Wilbur McIntyre, of New York, and Dr. R. W. Ward, of Jacksonville, N. C.

They came from Wilmington by the railroad as far as built, and by private conveyance the remainder of the way, and they report that about 32 miles of the road has been completed, which brings it within about 18 miles of Jacksonville. The road has been graded all the way to Jacksonville, and the surveyors are now twelve miles this side of it, and will reach Polkville by the middle of next week.

The Soldiers' Home.

The Soldiers' Home at Raleigh was to have been opened this morning, for the reception of the old veterans who so nobly and so faithfully served their State during the four years of as bitter a warfare as the world has ever seen, as the Raleigh News and Observer well says:

"More than a hundred thousand North Carolinians answered the call to arms and shared the fortunes of war; of them nearly thirty thousand fell victims of the conflict, and thousands returned to their homes with shattered constitutions, mutilated and suffering from dreadful wounds."

"Many have since paid the penalty of their patriotism and have joined in blissful peace Lee and Jackson and Hill and Pender, Branch and Anderson and Gordon, MacRae, Pettigrew, Burgwyn and Ramseur and their other leaders during those fearful years of war. And others still remain, lingering, bowed with advancing years, objects of our solitude. What warm heart will turn away, leaving the mute appeals unanswered?"

"Rather with what interest shall we not do our part to make easy their declining days! The sands of their lives have nearly run out; their struggle is nearly over. Let thoughts of their hard case engage us and let our hearts be warmer as we contemplate their situation and set about adding to their comfort and providing some alleviation for their pains."

"The Home has been opened. Its floors are bare. There are no fires on the hearth. The rooms have neither chairs nor tables, nor furniture of any kind."

"There are neither beds nor bed clothing; nor crockery, nor utensils—and the larder is not yet stored. In short, the house is empty, save alone the old soldiers who to-morrow will enter the door to find their resting places in the Soldiers' Home. But much is not needed. A few articles for each room; some conveniences; some well-worn carpets—some other things that we each can spare and never know it."
