Mr. Grady at Burgaw.
Mr. B. F. Grady, the nominee for Congress in the Third district, spoke at Burgaw a few days ago and a correspondent at that place (R. N. B.) sends us an interesting report of the occasion. This should have been published two days ago but was crowded out. Our correspondent says:
"In pursuance of a short notice the citizens of Pender assembled here to-day to hear our candidate for Congress, Hon. B. F. Grady, who spoke in the Court House to a large and enthusiastic crowd of earnest listeners for more than one hour. The people of Pender were very anxious to hear Mr. Grady; a good many of them had never seen him and their curiosity was aroused to see and hear the man who was so fortunate as to succeed our noble and worthy McClammy, as representative of the Third Congressional District. Mr. Grady made a most excellent and powerful speech, full of good common sense, and delivered in a very happy and eloquent style, so clear and logical that the simplest minds could fully comprehend its meaning and apply its force. He proved himself to be a man of great depth of thought, well versed in constitutional law and all questions at issue. He discussed the tariff and the sub-treasury bill, with an ease and manner characteristic of an old statesman, and exposed those features which he claimed were obnoxious and detrimental to the people. He showed himself well informed on the early history of the government, especially as bearing upon the usurpation of the New England monopolists and protectionists, and how their love of money and power had disregarded the rights of the South upon the great question of the tariff. He portrayed in masterly style the abomination of our present national banking system, and how it oppressed the farmer and laboring classes. He strongly advocated national legislation, looking to an income tax. Mr. Grady is evidently making a bold and aggressive campaign.
"Pender has heartily endorsed Mr. John D. Bellamy for the Senate. Mr. Bellamy has many warm and substantial friends in Pender county; having practised his profession here for a number of years, he is well and favorably known, and the people have great confidence in him as a successful lawyer, a man of ability and a clever gentleman, and the Democrats of Pender will support him to a man, in and out of the Alliance."
