





Mr. Grady at Burgaw.

Mr. B. F. Grady, the nominee for Congress in the Third district, spoke at Burgaw a few days ago and a cor respondent at that place (R. N. B.) sends us an interesting report of the occasion. This should have been published two days ago but was crowded out. Our correspondent savs :

"In pursuance of a short motice the citizens of Pender assembled here to-day to hear our candidate for Congress, Hon. B. F.
