### The Cold Storage Warehouse.

The cold storage warehouse erected here by the Armour Packing Co. of Kansas City, was opened to-day for inspection. It is located on the side of the railroad track at the upper part of Second street, and adjoins Messrs. W. E. Worth & Co's. ice factory. Mr. Jesse P. Harkness is the manager and he will take pleasure in showing visitors through the establishment. The first cargo of meat is expected here to-morrow and will be at once placed on sale. A large two-horse delivery wagon will be employed. It should be understood that the meat is not placed on ice but in a room entirely separate, there being no contact, and the temperature is kept steadily at the same point. Many visitors have called to-day and have been shown through the establishment and the workings and methods explained to them.

### Weekly Weather Crop Bulletin.

The reports of correspondents of the Weekly Weather Crop Bulletin, issued by the North Carolina Experiment Station and State Weather Service, co-operating with the United States Signal Service, show that the temperature and sunshine during the week ending last Saturday have been in excess, and the rainfall deficient; conditions altogether more favorable than those which have existed for several weeks. Light rain occurred on one or two days, the remainder of the week being bright and clear. Almost all the farmers' time has been devoted to cotton picking and gathering in corn, which is fully matured. Tobacco has all been cured. It is probable that the damage caused by the wet weather of preceding weeks will not be quite so serious as anticipated. The seeding of wheat and oats is progressing slowly. Light rain will occur during the earlier portion of this week, to be followed by fair, colder weather. The past season, on the whole, has been an unusually favorable one and the crops of cotton, tobacco, corn and rice raised in this State are fully up to, even above the average for many years.
