It is said there are no less than eight American girls at Lenox who have this year refused offers of marriage from titled foreigners.

William Rackard, who lives near Baynette, in Baldwin county, Ala., is the smallest man in America. He is 21 years of age and weighs only 49 pounds. He is three feet high and perfectly formed.

The fruit packers of California will suffer this year because of their contracts to deliver dried and canned fruits for about one-half the ruling rates. One large packing firm will lose about \$50,000 on prunes alone, while several smaller ones will probably lose under.

Speaker Reed's "business" Congress during its first session appropriated no less than \$462,939,956 of the people's money; not including the pension bill, which will absorb any here from \$35,000,000 to \$60,000,000. This is appalling extravagance, nothing less.

An Idaho bank on which there was a run piled upon the counter what was supposed to be \$40,000 in gold. This stopped the run and brought depositors, and when the trouble was over the gold was taken down. The packages contained iron washers cut to the thickness and size of \$20 gold pieces.

The opening of a unique theatre in Paris will take place shortly. Every play in the new house will be exclusively pantomimic, and will be performed by deaf mutes, and entitled "Love and Death," will be produced for the first time.

The Israelites of New York have formed an organization for sending to Palestine their countrymen who have been exiled from Russia. This rehabilitation of the Holy Land has been a dream of the Hebrews for a long time, and during the last ten years nearly twenty colonies, with a population of about 4,000 souls, have appeared on the sacred soil. The Israelites in all countries are favoring emigration to Palestine, and large sums have been collected in furtherance of the scheme.

Yesterday's New York Herald prints a carefully prepared review of the Congressional outlook, prepared by its Washington City correspondent. It takes in the whole field and is very comprehensive. The estimate, which the Herald classes as conservative—and it is extremely so—makes out a Democratic majority of eighteen in the next House with a probability that this may be increased. The estimate, as we have said, is very conservative and all really doubtful districts are given to the Republicans. In North Carolina, for instance, the Democrats are given seven districts and the Republicans two, a gain of one, but we feel pretty sure that the old State will do better than that this time. We are going to turn both Evarts and Brewer down and will give the rats, but one district, the Second.

The steam tug Easton, belonging to the U. S. government, and engaged in work on the river and bar, was burned last night, at about 8 o'clock. She was tied up at Eagle Island, opposite the city, and outside of the city limits. It is not known how the fire caught. No steamers were sent over from the city but the tug Marie, Capt. Edgar Williams, steamed alongside and soon had the fire out. There was also some slight damage to a scow lying alongside. The loss will probably foot up \$1,000 to \$1,200.
