THE INCREASE IN THE TAXABLE PROPERTY IN MECKLENBURG COUNTY, THIS STATE, IS REMARKABLE. IN 1870 THE COUNTY ISSUED \$300,000 IN BONDS, AND TOOK \$200,000 STOCK IN THE CHARLOTTE & ATLANTA AIR LINE RAILROAD AND \$100,000 STOCK IN THE ATLANTIC, TENNESSEE & OHIO RAILROAD. AT THAT TIME THE AGGREGATE PROPERTY IN THE COUNTY WAS ONLY \$4,000,000; IN 1880 IT HAD INCREASED TO \$5,904,610, AND IN 1890 IT SUMS UP A GRAND TOTAL OF \$11,178,780. AGAIN, IN 1870 THERE WAS BUT \$151,500 RAILROAD PROPERTY IN THE COUNTY FOR TAXATION, WHEREAS IN 1890 THERE IS \$27,686 RAILROAD PROPERTY ON WHICH THE COUNTY GETS TAXES.

It is reported in a semi-official way by a London journal of high life, that the Prince of Wales is disposed to countenance the recent action of the Duchess of Buccleuch in raising the bars to prevent the admission of undesirable Americans of both sexes into the upper circles of London society. It appears that his Royal Highness has been displeased with some of the distinguished American millionaires who have enjoyed the honor of being presented to him, and he is not unwilling to have his displeasure known by those who fail to guard their tongues or to adopt the proper demeanor in Court circles.

The Washington correspondent of the Alexandria (Va.) Gazette writes: "Col. John S. Mosby, in a letter to a friend here, states that he intends to vote the Democratic ticket in California this fall to mark his condemnation of Harrison's and Reed's sectional, Anti-Southern policy. He says that when Ex-Assistant Postmaster General Clark visited the Pacific coast last summer some Republicans of San Francisco gave him a banquet, to which he (Mosby) was invited, but he declined to attend it, on account of Clark's treatment of the Southern people, and especially his war on Southern women who hold small country postoffices. Col. Mosby also says that if he were in Virginia he would vote for General Lee for Congress."

The Governor-elect of Georgia, Mr. Northen, has always manifested great interest in educational matters, and the Georgians hope that that during his term as Governor he may be able to carry out some of his projects for providing better schools, and more numerous, for the farming sections of the State. Says the Macon Telegraph: "Residence on a farm in Georgia should not entail a penalty so severe as the loss of an education to the farmer's children, if farming is to continue to be a respectable and profitable business. In many parts of Georgia that penalty does run against the man who lives on a farm away from the schools which the towns and cities have established, and this fact has had much to do with the drift of population away from the country."


The aggregate taxable valuation of property within the city of New York, as estimated for the year 1890, are as follows: Real estate, \$1,338,800,007; personal estate, \$298,688,383—total, \$1,637,488,390. The amount of taxes imposed by ordinances adopted September 2, 1890, was \$33,212,034.96. The rate of tax upon the assessed valuations of real and personal estate, amounting to \$1,618,740,865, is 1.97 per cent—that is to say \$1.97 on \$100. The rate of tax upon the assessed valuation of personal estate of such corporations, joint stock companies, or associations as are subject to local taxation thereon, amounting to \$68,237,582, is 1.6089 per cent—that is to say, \$1.60 on \$100.
