The damage to both houses will not foot up more than \$500 and there was insurance for \$550 on the Hutson place, represented here by Messrs. Smith & Boatwright.

Col. J. D. Taylor, T. Donlan, J. W. Mills, Martin Newman, S. H. Fishplate and J. H. Currie, Esqs., were appointed a committee to act with the Executive Committee in receiving Capt. S. B. Alexander on his arrival in Wilmington next week.

An Honorable Award.

McIntire, of this city, offered at the Red Springs Fair a premium of \$5.00 to the young man who had arrived at the age of 21 years who could make affidavit that he had never touched intoxicating liquors as a beverage; and we have seen a very kind letter from Mr. McIntire, enclosing a check to Mr. J. T. Wright, 22 years old, a son of Mr. T. T. Wright, of this city, who bore off the prize. There are too few young men who can show so spotless a record—youth would be happier and would oftener secure the guerdons of temporal success if there were more. Seaman's Bethel.
The regular Sunday services at the Seaman's Bethel will be held to-morrow, as usual, led by Rev. T. H. Pritchard, D. D. All are cordially invited to attend, especially seamen, and masters of vessels are requested to have this notice read to their crews and their attendance urged upon these services.

City pastors are asked to give notice of this meeting in the different churches to-morrow morning and urge the attendance of Christian people upon these services, especially of ladies to help the singing. The seamen are appreciating the efforts being made for them in this direction.

The Late Alarm.
The late alarm of fire last night, sounded about midnight, was found to be on Eagle Island, opposite the city, but not "across the river," as one of our enterprising morning contemporaries has put it. It came from the naval stores yard of Mr. W. A. Martin and started in a rosin oil still in the yard. The Atlantic engine was sent over and also the Fifth Ward Hook & Ladder Co. and after a manful fight the flames were confined to the yard and subdued. At one time a large warehouse, filled with valuable and highly inflammable material, was in great danger, which was happily averted. Capt. Edgar Williams, with the steam tug *Marie*, was on hand and did much effective service in playing upon the buildings threatened by the flames.

The property destroyed was three turpentine stills, two oil stills, the sheds covering the plant, and a lot of stock, consisting mostly of oil and pitch. The stock belonged to Messrs. W. A. Martin & Co., and the loss on it will run from \$300 to \$500. The other property belonged to the First National Bank, and their loss will amount to about \$1,700. The loss is fully covered by insurance.
