In the opinion of the Providence Journal, the Democratic party of Rhode Island may possibly elect a Congressman this year.

A duty of 24 cents a pound has been placed on cayenne pepper by the McKinley tariff bill. The trade have made a corresponding advance in prices of red pepper.

The Colorado Democratic Club, of San Francisco, organized this year, is likely to exert a powerful influence on election day. Most of the prominent San Francisco negroes are members of the club.

The Massachusetts Republican platform demands that the "vast army of pension claim agents" at Washington be abolished. This is about the only decent thing a Republican convention has done in years.

The nomination of David A. Wells as Representative in Congress for the Third Congressional district in Connecticut came to him unsought, and was only accepted from a strong sense of duty. The Democrats of Connecticut are to be complimented for having pressed the nomination upon him and declining to accept his refusal.

Steno telegraphy is a new system of communication that is attracting some attention in France. The inventor, M. Casaghes, claims to be able to telegraph direct by a single wire manifold reports of speeches, either in short or long hand. The instrument resembles a typewriter, but is more difficult of manipulation. With it the inventor says he can transmit one hundred and seventy-five words a minute.

It is amusing to read in the Chicago Evening Journal, that "English free traders and their New York millionaires allies" are "up to the eyes in a money" and are "out-reaching of United Republics" with John Bull's double-eyes. The Democratic Congressional committee would be pleased to be favored with some of the "New York millionaires allies" who are contributing so generously to the Iowa Democratic campaign fund.

The massacre of the natives by natives of Vera, in East Africa, will doubtless arouse a spirit of retaliation, and England in her capacity of protector of Zanzibar may find her position surrounded by serious complications. The aggressive attitude which Germany has assumed toward the natives has not been forgotten by them, and in their eagerness to pay old scores they are not likely to stop to distinguish between vicious marplots and peaceful settlers.

When Baxter, the Republican candidate for Governor of Tennessee, held his opening meeting at Nashville, it was announced that negroes would not be allowed to occupy seats upon the floor of the House, but would be given accommodation in the galleries. The negroes said "No," they would have as good seats as the white people or they would absolutely refuse to give color to the meeting. The rule was withdrawn, and colored men "polka dotted" the assembly instead of sub-

A challenge has been issued by the Democratic committee of Richmond county, Ohio, for a debate to take place late in October at Mansfield. The Republican committee is asked to put Senator Sherman or Mr. McKinley upon the platform to oppose Mr. Harter, the Democratic candidate for Congress. Mansfield is in McKinley's district.

Unless the Omaha Bee, Republican, is decidedly a pessimistic paper, Nebraska may behave surprisingly this fall. What the Bee says is this: "It is necessary to say plainly that the Republican party of Nebraska this year cannot hope to win unless the canvass is pushed more vigorously and earnestly than it has been thus far. The exigency calls for an honest view of the situation and frank counsel, and the Bee deems it its duty to spur campaign managers and candidates on to greater activity."
