A petition to the Senate of the United States, protesting against take Lemon Elixir. the passage of the Conger lard bill. was signed by 10,000 Western farm ers at the St. Louis fair. The memorial says the bill, which emanated in Boston and was introduced in behalf of pork packers in that city, is not intended to benefit the agricultural classes; that it is class legislation; that it taxes cotton seed oil to enhance hog lard; that it has a tendency to produce centralization of power and arrays one American industry against another, and that its advocates are the demagogues of both parties.

The Omaha Bee, Rep., in summing up the effects of the new tariff bill, says: "In the statement submitted by the conferees with their report, it was estimated that the aggregate reduction by the bill will be about \$66,000,000, of which \$6,000,000 will be from the reduction of internal revenue taxes. The loss to the Treasury, however, whatever the amount, will not represent a gain to the people, but rather the increased cost of their higher taxed necessities. The only hope of compensation for this, so far as the producers of the West are concerned, is in the success of the reciprocity policy for enlarging the markets for their products," which the Minister to Berlin attention, and a remedy like Hood's Sarsasays cannot be done.

"It is evident," says the Philadelphia Telegraph, a high tariff Republican paper, "that, unless at the next session Congress passes one of the immigration measures which the labor of this country has for years asked it to pass, the workingmen of the United States are going to have a sorry time of it. The price of labor, as of other things, is fixed not by the more or less thut up in a profits of the employers, but by the supply and demand in the market. If the new tariff act is a good and just measure in that it prohibits the importation of the products of cheap foreign labor, then it must be conceded that it would be only just to pass a bill which would be, to some little degree at least, restrictive of cheap foreign labor itself. To put a prohibition upon the products while consistent with justice and wise policy, it is suicidal."
