THE LIBRARY CONCERT.

Fine Music—Crowded House—People Turned Away for Want of Room.

Those who were fortunate enough to get seats at the Library concert last night spent a delightful evening in listening to its varied excellent music.

Delicacy of touch and fine expression at the piano, quick and graceful execution on the mandolin, smooth and rich tones from the violinello, sweet harmony from voice and cello combined, orchestral effects from cornets, all these, interwoven with the various vocal solos and trios, gave variety to the programme and added greatly to the evening's pleasure.

Miss Bowden's voice showed remarkable finish and power and, while already one to delight an audience, promises still greater things for the future. Mr. Barbot has a fine bass voice of great compass, excellent in upper as well as lower notes, and is a valuable acquisition to Wilmington. Mr. Mayer's voice has, if anything, gained in volume and sweetness since last year. Miss Annie DeRosset's voice showed to a great advantage in the piece selected by her; and hearty and continued applause proved in how great favor she is held by her Wilmington friends, so loth to lose her. Mr. Murchison's performances on cello and mandolin were a surprise and delight; his composition and execution on one of his own pieces being such as to prove him to possess a true genius for music. Mrs. Taylor and Miss Gabrielle DeRosset, by their excellent and painstaking accompaniments, added much to the brilliancy of the various solos, duos and trios.

The concert was introduced by Capt. Bixby who took advantage of the occasion to reaffirm the value of a library and the needs of the present one; to call attention to the many improvements due to the zeal and efficiency of the principal librarian, Miss Sargent; and to ask from the Wilmington public an increased support and membership for the coming year.

"A Legal Wrong"

The Grand Rapids Eagle says of this piece, which is to be presented at the Opera House here on next Monday night: "The 'Legal Wrong' drew an excellent matinee yesterday afternoon, and last night there was, the very hot weather considered, another good house. The play on both occasions went smoothly, and the scenery hitches which to some extent marred the first performance were noticeably absent. The story is a very pretty one, not lacking in romance or dramatic situations, and the scenery is much more realistic than is usually carried. The storm, wreck and rescue is very effective, while the tropical island scene, with its stately palms and rolling, flashing sea was admirable. A number of songs and specialties are introduced with excellent effect, calling out great applause. The company is evenly balanced and the play on the whole is well worth the warm reception it receives every night."
