Wadesboro Messenger: Wadesboro cotton receipts for the month of October were 3,150 bales, and for September 2,952 bales, making 6,103 bales for the two months-just about what our receipts 'were for the whole of last season. - Early last Sunday night the cotton house on Mr. J. L. Pratt's plantation, near Morven, was burned down, together with about two bales of seed cotton and a lot of cotton seed. It is thought that the fire was of an incendiary origin, but as yet the guilty party has not been arrested.

Howard, of Fallstown township, has raised 113 bushels of sweet potatoes in addition to what the family have used. 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
