The Board and the Sewer.

The sanitary board of the city met last night at the City Hall to consult with City Engineer Chase about the contemplated reconstruction of Jacob's Run sewer. It was decided to lay two parallel, twenty-four inch terra cotta drain pipes from the head of the sewer to the river, one pipe to answer the requirements of the sewer proper and the other to carry off waste water in the event of heavy rains, etc.

The sewer is to be laid straight from its head to the river.

The City Engineer was authorized to correspond with manufacturers of terra cotta pipes at once, in order to ascertain the most advantageous price of pipe.
