

There is a far better and more just way of deciding it. At the election on Tuesday last the Northern Democrats made a clear gain of 66 Congressmen, while the Southern Demand presents in its columns matter to laterest ocrats only gained 21, and in States where there was practically no well organ zed opposition. The Northera Democrats had to fight the hardest for the victories which they won, and are, therefore, entitled to the highest praise, and if political rewards are to be distributed for the faithful and effective discharge of a patriotic duty, the Northern Democrats are entitled to greater considerations than their Southern
