Criminal Court.

The Baptist Church in North Carolina.

The report made to the Baptist
State Convention at Shelby showed
that there are now in North Caro-
lina 1,700 Baptist Sunday schools,
with 125,000 pupils. There are now
at the nine stations in Mexico, China
and Africa 27 missionaries from
North Carolina, and three more will
leave next month for China. There
are 104 missionaries at work in this
State, they being located in thirty-
two of the thirty-nine associations.
The contributions for home and for-
eign missions during the past year
were \$37,000, while \$13,000 were con-
tributed to the maintenance of the
Baptist Orphanage at Thomasville.

A Mad Ox and a Vexed Driver.

Saturday night about 8 o'clock
some fun was started on Water
street, near the market, by an angry
ox attached to a cart, and an excited
old colored man his master. The
ox was tied to a post when a steam-
boat passed by on its way up the
river, and just as it got opposite the
ox, who stood glaring at the steamer
and half scared to death, a tremen-
dous long blast of the whistle split
the air; and don't you forget it that
ox moved. He started down Water
street toward Market in such a
fright as would have surprised a
"cowboy." The nervous old man,
his master, grabbed the lines when
the steer started and managed to
get in the cart and remain there
until the mad animal reached Dock
street, when he gave a sudden turn
and inverted both rider and cart to-
gether with himself. The old man
wiggled a little while on the ground
and then got up and quietly drove
off with a tame ox.

Dr. Primrose Resigns.

Rev. J. W. Primrose, D. D., Pastor
of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church,
has received a call as a Synodical
Evangelist in Missouri and is dis-
posed to accept it. He announced
this fact at services in his church
last night and tendered his resigna-
tion, to take effect with the close
of the year. Subject, of course, to the
decision of the Presbytery, which
will be made known in a week or so.

Benj. Guirk Did the Stabbing.

Albert Tatzke, Benj. Guirk and
Randolph Sehnefeldt were brought
before the Mayor this morning,
charged with an assault with a
deadly weapon upon one Fred
Johnson, a seaman. The evi-
dence showed that Benj. Guirk did
the cutting and that the others were
implicated in the fight. They were
bound over to the present term of
the criminal court under \$100 bond
for each. Johnson was stabbed on
last Friday morning about 1 o'clock
near Paddy's Hollow. All implica-
ted are white sailors.

A Probable Fatal Affray.

This morning, at an early hour,
Hayes McDuffie and Randolph Cato,
two colored men, employed at
Messrs. Parsley & Wiggins' saw mill,
got into a difficulty while at work.
The quarrel passed off and no more
words were exchanged until about
an hour had elapsed, when Hayes
McDuffie came upon Cato as he was
stooping over to pick up one end of
a scantling, and drew a dirk from
his pocket and struck Cato a severe
blow across the small of his back.
Cato fell to the ground and cried,
"Hayes, you have killed me." Hayes
then ran and made his escape. The
wounded man was taken to a physi-
cian who dressed his wounds and he
was then conveyed to the City Hospi-
tal. The gash inflicted in Cato's
back and side was nine inches long
and two inches deep. At last ac-
counts the wounded man was re-
ported in a critical condition. Hayes
has not been apprehended. Officers
are in search of him.

Anything for a Change.

Once upon a time it was the cus-
tom for farmers and truckers to rake
together all of the dead leaves they
could find in the fall and make small
heaps of them. The fence corners
were also considered valuable in
this line. Now we are told by Prof.
Gerald McCarthy, of the N. C. Ex-
periment Station, that the leaves
should all be destroyed. He says:
"The owners of vineyards and or-
chards as soon as the leaves have
fallen should carefully rake the
leaves into a small pile and burn
them. All the shrunken, dried-up
fruit on the vines and trees should
also be removed and cast into the
fire. These shrunken fruits and
most of the fallen leaves contain
vast numbers of the winter spores of
the fungi-mildew, black-rot, an-
thraxnose and scab which may have
caused such a loss the past season."
Farmers should also clean up
their fields soon after Christmas and
burn all the trash and weeds in
fence corners. These trash piles
harbor noxious insects, weed-seeds
and fungi. It is much cheaper to
destroy them now than to fight them
next summer."




