Mr. Petroff, the superintendent who had charge of the census in Alaska, estimates the whole population of the territory at from 35,000 to 38,000 souls, about one-seventh of them white people, but as the full returns from outlying districts will not be in for six or seven months, yet the cold truth will not be known till next Spring.

The London Saturday Review of October 25th, in an article on the value of cavalry in modern warfare, devotes a good part of its space to an account of General J. E. B. Stuart's raid around McClellan's army in 1862. The writer says that brilliant as have been the feats of other cavalry leaders "nothing, perhaps, has surpassed the feats of this gallant prop of the South."

Some time before the election it was a matter of controversy whether Dudley was interesting himself in the Administration or as a friend of Dudley. Later it was decided, with a general consensus of opinion, that Dudley was working for Dudley and that the end at which he was aiming was to be elected a United States Senator. The Indiana people seem to have decided that they could do better.

Rev. W. J. Lhamon, of Minneapolis, has discovered that Herod was a politician. He sacrificed principle for policy, and oppressed the weak to please the strong. He committed murder for the favor of a faction, and courted his constituency at the expense of his justice. Claiming to be a king and a leader he was a slave to a howling mob majority. He bought votes at the price of his own manhood and the blood of the innocent.

In the early days of the present generation of business men there were, in popular estimation, but five millionaires in this country. They were William Gray, of Boston, John Jacob Astor and Stephen Whitney, of New York, Stephen Girard, of Philadelphia, and Nicholas Longworth, of Cincinnati. There are now at least five hundred in the city of New York alone, more than one of whom has an annual income equal to the combined fortunes of all the millionaires of half a century ago.

The Albany correspondent of the Philadelphia Record says: Congressman Roswell B. Flower declares that he does not want the New York United States Senatorship. It is said, upon good authority, that Governor Hill does not propose to accept the place, which he can have off hand if he wants it. This leaves Smith M. Weed a clear track with Hill's support for Everts' seat. The Legislature has a Democratic majority on joint ballot of five. Governor Hill's enthusiastic friends credit him with the intention of running for Governor again next year. They say that this is better than the Senatorship as a vantage ground for the Presidential fight in 1892, which Hill undoubtedly intends to make. It is claimed that he has the call on the nomination, and can be easily elected by a large majority. This would, his friends say, so significantly mark him for the Democratic nomination that he would have a walk over.

A singular experiment has just been made in Palestine, for the purpose of testing the accuracy of Dr. Colenso's statement that the people of Israel, after they had crossed the Jordan and were assembled in the valley between Mount Edal and Mount Gerizim, in obedience to the command Moses had given them, could not possibly have heard the curses and blessings from the heights as told in Deut. xxvii. Several friends who were on the spot determined to put themselves into the positions occupied by the Children of Israel, and accordingly, providing themselves with Bibles, two Scotchmen ascended Mount Edal and two Welshmen went up Mount Gerizim, which are both about 3,000 feet above the level of the sea, while the rest of the party remained in the fertile valley below, which is about 1,500 feet deep. Then one of the Scotchmen, taking upon himself the part of the Levite of old, proceeded to read the curses, while his Welsh friends, from Mount Gerizim, replied with the blessings. Both of them were distinctly heard in the valley and the party, standing there, reverently responded with the answers.
