Slam keeps up with the procession. She is to have an electric railway thirty miles long.

Canada has 58,500 miles of telegraph wire, and did a business in 1889 of 4,927,581 dispatches.

During the past seventy-three years the American Bible Society has distributed over 52,750,000 copies of the Scripture.

"Cleveland and Palmer" is the ticket which the Chicago *Herald* is at present supporting as, in its judgment, the best that can be made for 1892.

The Indianapolis Sentinel and several other Indiana papers are urging that Congressman elect William D. Byrum, of their State, is just the man to be Speaker of the 52d Congress.

The Italian and Lepanto, of the Italian navy, are two of the largest war ships ever built. They are 400 long, 74 feet broad, and possess a mean draught of water exceeding 30 feet.

Sheriff Alison is authority for the statement that, in the city of Glasgow alone, 30,000 people get drunk every Saturday night, and crime has increased six times faster than population.

The new French tariff imposes duties on over 1,000 articles, while ours covers only about 850. But ours gets there, all the same. At least it did on the first Tuesday of this month.

Hamburg drives what may be called a roaring trade in wild beasts. Lions and tigers can be ordered at 1,900 francs apiece. A good rhinoceros, however, will fetch from 8,000 francs to 28,000 francs.

The people of the United States consume, it is said, 200,000,000 bottles pickles annually. About 90 per cent of this amount is credited to the Republicans, since the recent election, as they look exceedingly sour.

The distance travelled by Stanley in the interior of Africa is estimated by him at 5,400 miles, of which all but 1,000 were on foot. The expedition occupied three years, and rescued 300 persons, at a cost of less than £30,000.

The highest church spire in the world has just been completed. It is that of the Cathedral at Olm, Wurtemberg, and is 580 feet high. The top of the cross on the dome of St. Peter's, Rome, is 448 feet above the pavement.

During the first nine months of the year 244,456 emigrants left England, as compared with 282,876 during the corresponding months of last year. There have been only 49,348 Irish emigrants, as against 56,644 during the same period in 1889.

Col. Vilas, who was Postmaster-General under Cleveland, is the leading candidate for the United States Senatorship in Wisconsin, but it is by no means certain that he will be elected, for there is strong opposition to him in his own party.

The accumulation of wealth, estimated at 14 per cent. of the gross earnings of mankind, now aggregates \$5,000,000,000 per annum, and is increasing, relatively as well as absolutely, from year to year. The pension sharks at Washington City come in for a big slice of this pie.

The Hon. Clifton R. Breckinridge, of the 2d district of Arkansas, who was unjustly deprived of his seat by the Republican majority in Congress, has not only been sent to the 52d Congress by a decisive majority, but he has also been elected to fill the unexpired term in the present Congress. Most of the members of the present House who were active in unseating Mr. Breckinridge were defeated for re-election.

## Criminal Court.

The following cases were disposed of in this court to-day: State vs. James Quinn and W. H. Anderson, affray. Anderson found guilty. State vs. Ben Mathis, larceny. Two years in Penitentiary. State vs. John Wright and Wm. Simmons, affray. Simmons found guilty.

Yesterday afternoon Charles Robbins and Robt Jones, both colored boys, were charged with burglary in the second degree in breaking into the house of M. Bellamy, Esq., during the absence of the family last summer. Robbins submitted, and Jones was tried and found guilty, but the judgment of the court was at the request of the Solicitor withheld until to-day. Indictments were also found against Jones for breaking open and robbing the residences of Mr. W. H. Northrop and Mr. E. J. Powers last summer during the absence of the owners, but the Solicitor stated that these cases would not be tried at this term; the papers, however, would be filed and ready for use after Jones had served his first term in the Penitentiary.

## Deeply, Darkly, Desperately Dull.

Down on the wharf they are feeling the effects of the money troubles in New York and London. There is no real trouble here, only a general dullness. The effect is everywhere the same. The Baring Bros' trouble is largely responsible for this. It is almost impossible to negotiate foreign exchange and of course this has a depressing effect upon the markets. New York is fast recovering from the Wall street troubles, however, and in a few days we may look to see the markets everywhere resuming a healthy tone. In the meantime cotton is tumbling and naval stores are on the ragged edge. The receipts, however, are light and this helps to tone the market. We got here yesterday 119 casks spirits, 708 barrels rosin, 75 barrels tar and 9 barrels crude turpentine, exceeding Charleston, where the receipts yesterday footed up but 93 casks spirits and 180 barrels of rosin.

## Prohibition Meeting.

The Prohibitionists met last night at the City Hall pursuant to notice given. About one-third of those present were colored.

Rev. Dr. Pritchard called the meeting to order and nominated Rev. Dr. Creasy for chairman.

The motion was carried and Dr. Creasy took the chair, Mr. W. H. Shaw being requested to act as secretary.

Dr. Creasy made a short speech, strongly advocating Prohibition.

Mr. J. M. Forshee submitted a motion, which was adopted, to appoint a committee of eighty-four from each race—to appoint an executive committee to consist of fifty members, white and colored. The chair was authorized to appoint the committee of eight, and named Messrs. Preston Cumming, J. M. Forshee, L. W. Sneed and J. R. Marshall as the white members of said committee.

Addresses were then made by Rev. Dr. Pritchard, Rev. Mr. Anderson, Rev. Dr. Creasy, and Rev. Alexander (colored), Rev. Dr. Sanders (colored), Rev. Spicer, (colored), and John H. Whiteman (colored).

On motion of Mr. Forshee, the committee of arrangements was directed to appoint a time and place for the next meeting and give notice thereof.

The meeting then adjourned.

## The Heavens on Fire.

Some beautiful meteors were observed last evening darting across the northern sky. Some of them looked as large as skyrockets. It is just the right time of year now for these celestial visitants. It was in November, 1833, that the great meteoric shower took place. One who saw it describes it to us as a grand, beautiful and impressive sight. The excitement here was intense. For an hour or more the meteors shot athwart the sky, darting hither and thither and disappearing as suddenly as they appeared. Many thought that the last day had come; that day in which St. Peter says that it "will come as a thief in the night; in the which the heavens shall pass away with a great noise and the elements shall melt with fervent heat; the earth also, and the works that are therein shall be burned up." People prayed that night who had long been unused to prayer, moans and lamentations were heard on all sides and the negroes, in especial, were on their knees in most fervent supplications for pardon and mercy. It was certainly a night never to be forgotten by those who saw the wild commotion overhead.
