Africa has now at work within her borders 10 American, 12 British and 12 Continental missionary societies. There are more than 700 ordained missionaries and more than 7,000 native preachers. It is estimated that there are, both white and native, about 175,000 communicants and 800,000 adherents.

The British Museum has secured from Thibet a copy of the "Jang-yu," a monster encyclopedia of Thibetan Buddhism. It comprises 225 volumes, each of which is two feet long by six inches thick. Three thousand rupees formed the price for the work, which was formerly in the possession of a Buddhist monastery in Thibet.

A Californian, just arrived at the National capital from the Pacific coast, tells a reporter of the Washington Post that California would certainly have gone Democratic if Senator Stanford hadn't, in response to urgent telegrams, hurried home to "direct" the Republican canvass. What methods are covered by that word "direct" do not appear in the additional remarks of the Californian as printed in the Post.

There is a disposition showing on the part of the Democratic press of the country to make generous acknowledgment of the indebtedness of the Democratic party for its recent great victory to that distinguished Republican, Major McKinley. The Des Moines (Iowa) Leader says that there are not two more efficient workers for the Democratic party in the nation than Senator Carlisle and Representative McKinley.

"I am surprised," the St. Louis Globe Democrat quotes President Harrison as saying, "that newspaper publishers send their representatives to me for an interview. They must understand that I cannot talk except on extraordinary occasions for publication. Why, if I should make it a rule to talk to representatives of the press I would be kept busy, and perhaps in hot water also. I do not blame newspaper publishers for trying to secure interviews with me if they can accomplish it, but I will not be interviewed."

On the side of the Big Black Mountain, says the Louisville Courier-Journal, about 300 yards from the Wise county line, in Harlan county, Ky., there stood until last week the most valuable tree in the South Appalachian Mountains. It is curled grain black walnut, and the owner had it grubbed up by the roots so as not to lose even a chip. A New York lumber dealer bought the tree from ignorant mountaineers for \$50, paid a man \$300 to move it to the nearest railroad, and thinks he will make a profit of \$5,000.

Since July 19 the outgo from the United States treasury has been \$163,000,000 or \$70,000,000 in excess of receipts! Of this amazing excess \$50,000,000 went for pensions and \$13,600,000 in new notes for the purchase of silver. The \$100,000,000 went to Wall street in the purchase of bonds to ease that insatiable market. The treasury is reduced to small change without appreciably improving the financial situation. The surplus is gone, and taxes are heavier. All because Congress at its last session was dominated by greedy private interests.

A friend of Czar Reed tells a representative of the Boston Traveller that the Czar will, "when he gets good and ready," talk about the election, and he intimates that Blaine, the reciprocalist, will be severely castigated. Asked what the Czar had against Blaine, the "friend" said: "Blaine did everything that he could to bedim the chances of Republican success and to belittle the McKinley bill. He had the face to say that it was purely an Eastern measure, absolutely injurious to Western interests, notwithstanding the fact that the West had received every possible consideration."
