It is said that for more than fifty years \$335, which was originally intended to be applied to the education of slaves in Georgia, has been lying in the Bank of Scotland.

Closing his account with last Wednesday night, Corporal Tanner has made in fees out of pension cases more than \$197,000 since he left the pension office to be succeeded by Mr. Rann.

It's a case of "making a mountain out of a mole-hill," the Boston Traveller thinks, the persistent and serious exploitation by the New Sun of Hill as the candidate for the Presidency.

The Ohio State Journal thinks that McKinley will be nominated for Governor of Ohio, when the time comes, without opposition, and it suggests that Foraker will be the proper person to make the nominating speech.

The largest apartment house in the world is located in a suburb of Vienna. It contains between 1,200 and 1,500 rooms, divided into upwards of 400 suites of rooms, 4 to 6 rooms each. They are now occupied by over 2,000 people.

The New York Society to Befriend Domestic Animals announces that "starving or homeless dogs or cats will be called for, and as soon as the cats and dogs now at home are in good enough condition to be given away they will be exchanged for animals in poor condition."

Our friend Wade Harris, of the Charlotte News, is out for David B. Hill for President. You had best Wade out, old man, or you'll feel mighty lonesome about the time the Democratic Convention meets. If Cleveland lives he will be nominated and elected, with or without New York.

William E. Russell, Governor-elect of Massachusetts, is only 33 years old—the same age that Robert E. Pattison was when first chosen Governor of Pennsylvania. Sherman Hoar, elected to Congress by the Democrats of Massachusetts, is only 30 years of age. The young Democrats are coming to the front.

The Salvation Army has money and property in the different countries where it is established valued at \$3,213,000. The trade effects, stock, machinery and goods on hand are valued at \$530,000. Some idea of the trade department may be gathered from the fact that they sell 22,000 army bonnets every year to the female soldiers.

There are in New York city more than four hundred clubs in which men do congregate with property valued all the way from \$25,000,000 to \$40,000,000, and chiefly devoted to gastronomy. Fourteen large new club houses are in process of building, at a cost of at least \$3,000,000, in addition to renovation of old structures.

The New York Herald's Washington correspondent is busy exposing the workings of the Pension Bureau and the agents. He shows that the big surplus left by Cleveland is all gone and that unless the tide is checked next year's pension account will be nearly \$200,000,000. This means that the national debt must be increased to pay it.

A company has been formed, under the supervision of the Government, for the irrigation of the steppes in Southern Russia. It proposes to dig canals and lead water to lands belonging to the Government, to various rural constituencies and to private persons. Several Government engineers have been detailed for the service of the company, which will begin work in the Crimea

One thing is about as clear as mud. Either the dependent pension act must be modified or repealed, or the national debt be increased to pay it, or an income tax for this purpose must be levied. In the latter event some of Mother Cary's chickens will come home to roost.

There is every likelihood that next year will see the whole of the population of Iceland on the way to Canada or the United States. From the official statistics it appears that fully 20,000 natives, or about one-fourth of the entire population of the island, have already emigrated to this continent. Property has greatly depreciated and taxes increased till there is great complaining and a great desire to remove to more prosperous lands.
