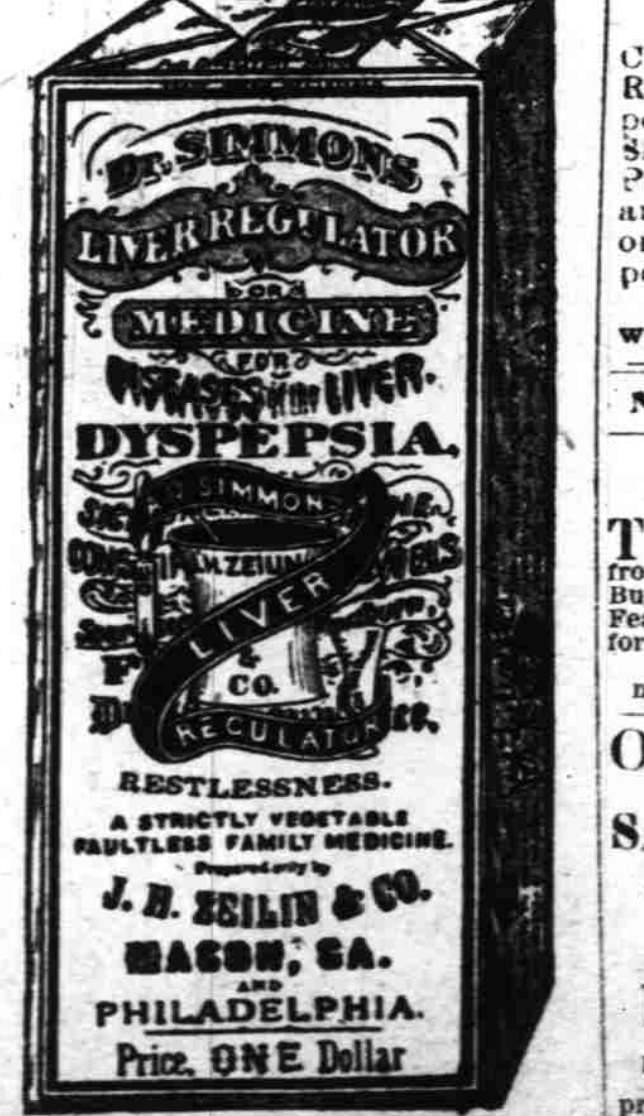
Beef and Beef. Beef is cheaper in Wilmington than in almost any city on the Atlantic seaboard. Such as was sold here this morning for 12 1/2 cents we have seen sell for 15 cents in Richmond, 20 cents in Jacksonville and 25 cents in Savannah. We know of some people who pay 30 cents a pound for all the beef they eat and yet it is no better than can be bought here for 12 1/2 and 15 cents.

No Water. Capt. Black, the popular commander of the steamer Lisbon, plying on Black River, informs us that he has been able to make but seven through trips as far as Clear Run this year, while last year he made ninety-four during the corresponding time. He seems to harbor the idea that the water has run out, never to return, but it is only one of those remarkably dry seasons, the like of which can hardly be remembered by the 'oldest inhabitant.'

He also states that the farmers all through the upper Black river section are gathering such bountiful harvests as have never been known before, even by the aforesaid standard ready reference, 'the oldest inhabitant.' Capt. Black has traveled extensively within the last few weeks through the country contiguous to Black river, and everywhere the crops are unprecedentedly abundant.

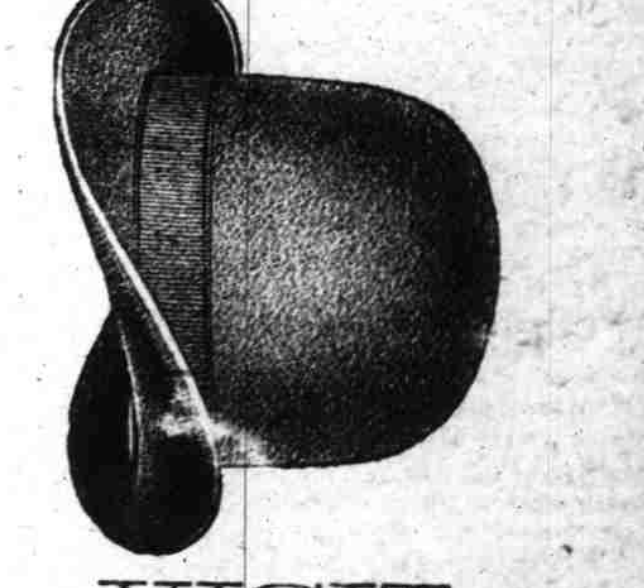
