"It is not," remarks the Brooklyn Eagle, "the least among the virtues that constitute the fragrant cluster of Mr. Cleveland's characteristics that if Providence had not ordained him to secular pursuits he would have made a first-rate preacher."

Joseph G. Cannon's "mouth" is quoted as saying, in reply to the statement that if the pension appropriation grew much larger the country would go into bankruptcy: "Though the pension roll may reach \$150,000,000 a year I have no doubt that the revenue legislation which the Republicans have enacted will be sufficient to meet all the ordinary expenditures of the Government and pay our obligations to the old soldiers too."

New York State's total gain in population in the past ten years was 839,653, and the figures relating to the towns and cities above 4,000 show a growth of 931,356. These larger places thus absorbed the whole population in increase, and drew 80,000 more people from the rural sections. But the five cities of New York, Brooklyn, Buffalo, Rochester and Syracuse gained altogether over 721,000 or nearly the whole of the total increase for the State. We can get from these facts some idea of the enormous attractive power the large city has come to possess in the republic.

Somebody at the White House appears to be a thrifty person, says the Washington correspondent of the New York Times. A notice on the front door of the Executive Mansion informs the public that visitors are not admitted after 2 p. m. A New York gentleman who was "doing" Washington a few days ago escorted two ladies to the White House, but on reaching the door he was told that it was too late to see the house. It was explained that at that hour the ladies of the President's household took possession of the parlors and could not be disturbed. The gentleman was an experienced sightseer. He slipped a two dollar bill into the hands of the attendant and remarked that the ladies with him were very anxious to see the White House that day. The attendant promptly changed his mind, and under his escort the visitors had the pleasure of going through the house. Nobody but a Democrat would complain that two dollars is too high a price to pay to see the interior of the temporary residence of Benjamin Harrison.

The Illinois Legislature, says the Washington Democrat, is quite in the habit of being close when there is a Senatorship at stake. The members are elected on a system of minority representation, and therefore represent the political division of the voters more accurately than the members of any other Legislature in the country. A majority of 30,000 looks substantial, but when it is a majority in a vote of three-quarters of a million it shows that the two parties are very evenly balanced, and if you try to reproduce the same party ratio in a body of 304 members you are bound to have a very small majority. In 1876, when, after a long fight, General Logan was defeated and Justice Davis was elected, there were five hold-over Senators elected on the granger ticket in 1874, and neither the Republicans or Democrats had a majority. In 1885, when, after a fight of months, Col. Morrison was defeated and General Logan was re-elected, the Legislature was split until a Democratic member died and the Republicans managed to elect his successor. The composition of the present Legislature is not quite certain yet, but it appears that the balance of power is held by three members of the Farmers' Mutual Benefit Association, one of whom is a Democrat and the other two received some Republican votes.
