Union Meeting - Second Day's Proceedings.
The association met again at 7 o'clock last night pursuant to adjournment. Mr. John T. Bland, the President, called the meeting to order, with Mr. D. J. Corbett secretary.
The subject discussed was "Are Churches Doing their Duty to the Young." It was ably argued by Messrs. D. J. Corbett, D. P. Bland, Rev. F. T. Wooten, of Caintuck; and Dr. T. H. Pritchard, of Wilmington.
The meeting then adjourned until this morning at 10 o'clock.
The meeting was opened at 10 with devotional exercises conducted by Mr. Bland.
Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved, after which several of the delegates asked to be excused from further attendance on the meetings, as they were obliged to return in order to reach their homes before Sunday. Their request was granted.
The query, "Is the World to be Convinced before the Second Coming of Christ?" was then taken up, the discussion being opened by Rev. Dr. Pritchard in the affirmative. He made a powerful argument in advocacy of the idea, and quoted many passages of Scripture to sustain his argument.
Rev. R. E. Peele, in the negative, thought he knew as much about the matter as anybody else, and that was just nothing at all; also quoting many passages of the New Testament to show that no one ever did know or ever can know when Christ is to appear the second time.
The matter was finally laid on the table, and after some routine business the meeting adjourned to meet again at 7 o'clock to-night.

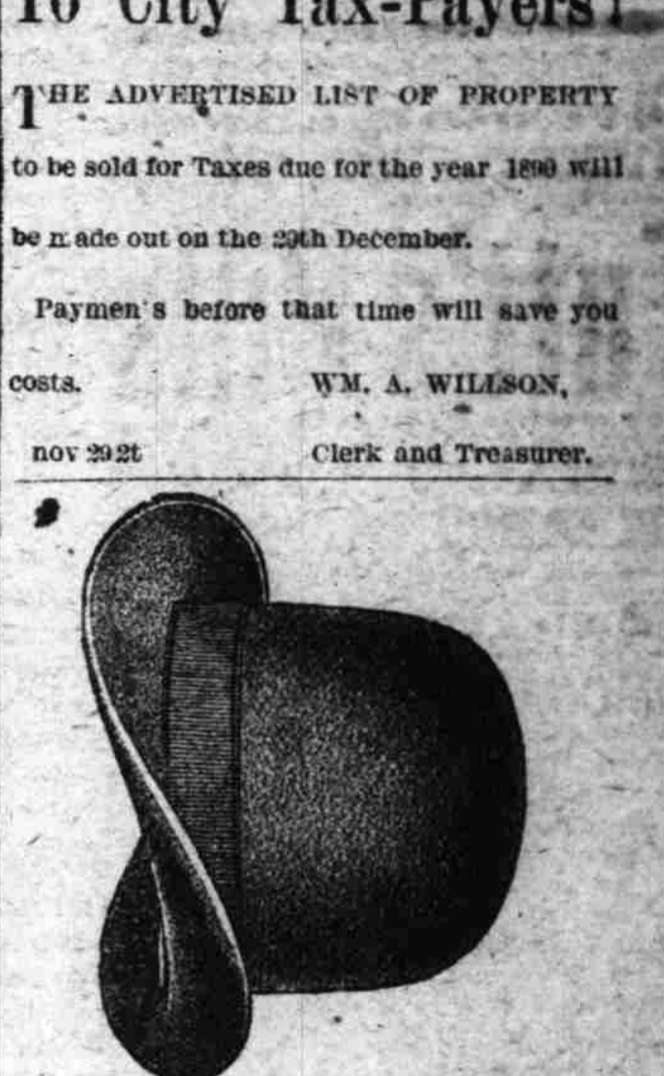
