A tunnel between Scotland and Ireland is discussed, thirty miles long, to cost \$40,000,000.

Parisians send each year \$3,000,000 letters, 13,000,000 postal cards and 85,000,000 newspapers.

The St. Louis Globe Democrat is for Blaine and Hill in 1892; Blaine on one ticket, of course, and Hill on the other.

The Delamater failure is a bad one, almost as bad as D's failure at the polls last month. The creditors think they will do well if they get 50 cents on the dollar.

A tush seven feet long and a tooth weighing over seven pounds, supposed to have been part of a mastodon, have been unearthed at Monson, Ia.

Familiarity with leprosy has made Sandwich Islanders so careless that they sometimes allow school teachers suspected of being tainted with the loathsome disease to ply their vocation.

Between January 1 and November 15 the shipments of orchard and vineyard products of Fresno county, Cal., amounted \$3,400,000 pounds. It required 1,170 cars to move this immense load.

Father Ignatius, of the English Church, is preaching to tremendous congregations. He denounces fashionable religion and prays for the brotherhood of all Christian churches. He is in New York.

The most expensive legislature in the world is that of France. It costs annually about \$3,600,000. The Spanish Parliament costs \$250,000; the Italian, \$430,000; the Belgian, \$200,000; the Portuguese, \$150,000.

Dr. Deems, in the Church of the Strangers, in New York, on Sunday morning stated that the church was \$800 in arrears and in just fourteen minutes the amount was subscribed, \$100 over. No single subscription was more than \$20.

It is said that not less than \$100,000 worth of "corn cures" are annually sold in the United States. There are some of them that may be not-unreasonably regarded as cultivating corns enough to account for the sales of the others.

At Italy, Texas, last Saturday, a large eagle swooped down upon and seized a four year old child and then flew off. The father followed with his gun and when the eagle alighted near a creek and stood on the child's body, he took a good, long aim and shot it dead.

The California friends of Senator Leland Stanford claim that his Presidential boom for 1892 grows just in proportion to the decline of that of President Harrison. There is danger of an explosion in all these premature outputs. This the Senator doubtless has in mind when he disclaims any such ambition.

The San Francisco Alta California, of Nov. 20, says: "The man for Clerk of the next House is Whittorne, of Tennessee. He is able, qualified, experienced and deserving. The Speaker will be a Northern man, and the South should have the Clerk, and in all the South there is no man who outgoes the old Tennesseean in merit and fitness."

County Treasurer Elijah Hewlett submitted his monthly report showing a balance of \$15,942.51 to the credit of the general fund on hand.

Justices W. H. Strauss, W. W. Harris and Jno. D. Taylor submitted their annual reports which were ordered filed.


