**Disaster at Southport.**  
A dispatch from Mr. Doshier, act-  
ing Signal Observer at Southport,  
received here this noon, says that  
the little schooner Joe Neff, 15 tons  
burthen, from Lockwood's Folly for  
this city, went ashore this morning,  
at daylight, on Piney Point Beach,  
about three miles Southwest of  
Southport, during a heavy Wester-  
ly gale. The crew consisted of two  
men only, Riley Lewis and Charles  
Price, both colored. Lewis, who  
was the skipper, was saved, but  
Price died from exhaustion after  
being taken ashore. The vessel and  
cargo will prove a total loss.

**The Wind and the Weather.**  
The cautionary Northwest storm  
signal was hoisted here last night at  
10:15 o'clock, in obedience to orders  
from Washington City. It was also  
ordered at Charleston, Morehead  
City and Washington. There was a  
storm at that time on the South  
Carolina coast, and high northwe-  
sterly winds were expected. The wind  
got here but it was not very high.  
We seemed to be on the outer edge  
of the storm. But the temperature  
became decidedly colder and there  
was considerable rain. The wires  
were down this forenoon and the  
usual forecast could not be had but  
the local forecast says that the weath-  
er will be decidedly colder this  
afternoon and to-night. There will  
probably be plenty of ice to-morrow  
morning.

There was snow last night on the  
C. C. R. R. West of Laurinburg.

**Board of Aldermen.**  
A called meeting of the Board of  
Aldermen was held yesterday after-  
noon at the City Hall. All the mem-  
bers, with the exception of Alder-  
men Scott and Bell, were present.

Mayor Fowler stated the object of  
the meeting: To consider a petition  
of the Wilmington, Onslow & East  
Carolina Railroad Company for  
right of way for the said road  
through the extreme southern por-  
tion of the city, along and across  
the following named streets, viz:  
From Kidder's street northwardly  
along Front street to a point be-  
tween Wright and Dawson streets,  
with the right to cross Dawson street  
or its prolongation, between Front  
and Surry street; and thence, when  
Surry street shall be reached, along  
it to Church street. The petitioners  
also ask that Surry street (now  
opened only to a point just south of  
Wooster street)—may be extended to  
Dawson street—for the purpose of a  
right of way for the railroad. This  
petition was accompanied by another  
of similar purport from property  
owners asking that the W., O. & E.  
C. R. Co. be granted the right of  
way as above set forth. The latter  
petition is signed by S. & W. H.  
Northrop, W. L. Smith for self and  
S. W. Skinner & Co., Carolina Oil  
and Cressote Co., and F. A. Lord.

Alderman Smith protested against  
any hasty action being taken by  
the Board in the matter, and after  
some discussion a motion was made  
by Alderman Montgomery to refer  
it to a special committee to make  
report at a called meeting of the  
Board on or before the 23d inst.

This motion was adopted and the  
Mayor appointed as the committee  
Aldermen Montgomery, Smith and  
Craft.

Alderman Pearsall spoke in regard  
to the proposition made some time  
since to codify the laws of the city,  
and offered the following resolu-  
tion, which was adopted, viz:  
**Resolved,** That the attention of  
the Board of Audit and Finance be  
called to the appropriation of \$500,  
made by this Board for codifying  
the laws and ordinances, with the  
request that early action be taken  
in the matter.

The Mayor appointed as a special  
Sewerage Committee Alderman  
Post, (chairman) Mayor Fowler,  
Alderman Scott, Supt. of Health  
Dr. F. W. Potter, and City Surveyor  
J. C. Chase.

The meeting then adjourned.

**Alligator Shoals.**  
Capt. W. H. Bixby, U. S. Engi-  
neer in charge of river and harbor  
improvements, in a note to the RE-  
VIEW, says: "Surveys recently made  
of the dredged cut between Green  
field and Alligator creeks, below  
Kidder's mills, show a least depth of  
16.6 feet, increasing from that to 21  
feet, over a width of 270 feet. This  
work was done during the last con-  
tract and has kept its depth very  
satisfactorily."

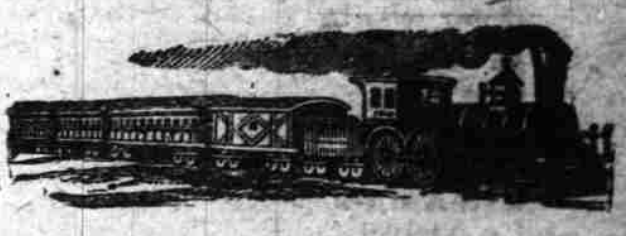
