New Schedule for Clyde Steamers.

From and after January 3d (next Saturday) a regular weekly steamer of the Clyde line, sailing from New York to this port, will go through to Georgetown, S. C. A Painful Accident.

An Interesting Decision.

A very interesting case was heard yesterday afternoon before Justice John Cowan, into whose court the case had been removed on affidavit from the Mayor's Court. A difficulty occurred between two citizens on North Front street, the result of a little "guying." One of the billigents afterwards called upon a policeman, claiming that he had been struck, to arrest his opponent. This the policeman attempted to do, after first advising the complaining citizen to get out a warrant. Without any warrant in his possession and without having seen the fracas the officer attempted to make the arrest. He refused to be arrested unless on a warrant and when the officer raised his club in an attempt to strike him the citizen seized him by the throat. Another policeman who had come up caught the club and prevented the blow. The two were then separated and the parties went up to the City Hall and submitted to arrest.

Mr. Marsden Bellamy appeared for the citizens. Justice Cowan, after carefully hearing weighing the testimony, decided that the officer was not authorized to make the arrest and discharged the defendant. The assault and battery case was continued until Monday.

Justice Cowan's decision opens a wide field for discussion and it is well that this decision should come. The powers and duties of a policeman should be clearly defined. The interest at present hangs upon the question as to whether a policeman can exercise the right of making an arrest for a violation of the peace which does not come under his own immediate observation, at the simple request of another party and without a warrant. If he can, his powers exceed those of a magistrate for no justice of the peace will issue a warrant upon mere hearsay and unless an affidavit is made as to the offense. Indeed, the grand jury cannot do this.

A Powder Explosion.

It is reported that there was a very disastrous explosion of powder at Jacksonville on Christmas Day. Some one got four pounds of powder with which to fire a salute in an old cannon there and while in a house with the paper bag containing the powder in his hand a spark from a cigar he was smoking got into the powder and it exploded, burning the man and too ladies fearfully. One of the latter, it is said, was dreadfully burned about the chest. We could get no further particulars nor could we learn the names of the parties.
