The New York Herald calls the citizens of New Orleans who shot the assassins to death "a mob," in that they were acting beyond the pale of the law. They have a notable precedent. When Abraham Lincoln called for 75,000 volunteers in April, 1861, there was no law under which he acted; in fact, his proceeding was in direct contravention of the Constitution of the United States, which he had sworn to support. Did the Herald then call those 75,000 men a mob and Lincoln an "assassin?" We pause for a reply.

On Saturday last two thousand of the best citizens of New Orleans repaired to the jail and shot and hanged eleven of the Italians there in incarcerated on the charge of being concerned in the murder of Police Chief Hennessey. The men had been tried in the court and the jury had failed to convict. The evidence was clear for conviction and bribery is charged. Under these circumstances some of the best people in the city, lawyers, doctors, merchants and mechanics, went in the open daylight and proceeded to take the law into their own hands. This deed was but the culmination of a long line of outrages by the Italian secret assassination societies in New Orleans which have gone unchecked. Chief Hennessey was engaged in ferreting out some murders in the Italian quarter and for this he was barbarously shot down within a few feet of his own door. Chief Hennessey was the thirtieth victim of the dagoes and not one of those crimes had been avenged. In every case the assassins escaped. Is it any wonder then that the people of New Orleans arose in their might and smote the murderers, hip and thigh?

There is no question but that the men who participated in this affair were acting outside of the pale of the law, i. e., as the law is written. But there are times when the law is powerless to convict as there are times when it is unable to execute its own decrees. At such times the people become a law unto themselves. It is from them that the law itself derives its own prerogatives, as they are the source and foundation of all authority. For *populi vox Dei* is not a sentiment, it is a fact.

It was cold yesterday morning, with ice almost everywhere. Towards the afternoon the wind got around to the southeast and the weather moderated somewhat.

Almost every house in town is a hospital and there is scarcely a family where some one is not suffering from the effects of a severe cold. The doctors are kept busy but the complaints are light. The weather is what's the matter.

We find very little evidence of damage by the cold snap in the city. Some tender plants have been nipped but none cut down. We examined a fig tree, almost in full leaf, and with small figs on it, and the only injury we found was one withered leaf, near the ground.

How the Deal Fell Through.

The recent deal, whereby the Seaboard Air Line Company was to get control of the Georgia Southern road, turns out to have been no deal at all. A Baltimore special says: "Mr. John M. Robinson, Maj. J. C. Winder, general manager, and Louis McLane, a director of the Seaboard & Roanoke, went South in the early part of last week to examine the Southern Georgia road, in pursuance of the policy determined upon when the Sparks-Robinson deal was made.

"When the option was taken on the Georgia Southern road from Macon to Palatka by the Seaboard & Roanoke the agreements bearing on this subject were drawn in this city, and it was fully set forth that the contract should be binding only in the event of the affairs of the road and the construction company being found satisfactory after such examination as the Seaboard people might make. In the event of the lease being accepted after such examination the Seaboard road was to build a line from Macon to Elberton to connect the Georgia Southern with its system. The investigation has not been satisfactory, as the following dispatch received by Mr. Hoffman from one of the Robinson party Saturday will show:

"Contract off. Things not as represented."

"In explanation, the Georgia Southern men say that while the Robinson party was at Macon an expert examined the books of the treasurer of the construction company, and the books of the Georgia Southern officers. It is reported that one excuse advanced by Robinson why he didn't take the road was, that in the examination of the Georgia Southern's books the earnings of the road for last January were found to be about \$64,000, whereas the earnings for that month had been reported to him by President Sparks, while in Baltimore, to be about \$74,000. President Sparks made this report, based on a telegram he had received from Manager Knapp, who gave the figures, having been requested by Sparks to wire him the earnings. Robinson, so it is said, claims that the agreement to lease was based on the \$74,000 of earnings for the month of January. The agreement was really based on the \$80,000 of earnings per year. Granting that the earnings for January were only \$64,000, then this average for twelve months would make \$768,000, only \$32,000 less than \$800,000. But the business of the road increases monthly, and is readily earning \$800,000. The reason of this difference between \$64,000 and \$74,000 was due to the fact that Robinson deducted certain charges from the earnings, which should not have been done. Car mileage was estimated differently."

This hitch in the trade has given rise to the rumor that the Richmond and West Point Terminal is making a move on the railroad chess board whereby it will scoop in the Seaboard Air Line system. No sensible man anywhere believes any such rumor.
