It may be doubted if a worse Judge than Julius J. DuBose, of Tennessee, ever disgraced the bench of the South west. He has been impeached and removed from office, and to-day there is none so poor as to do him reverence. "If we had failed to secure his removal from office," said one of those arrayed against him, "we would have had to kill him or assassinate him, or the few of us whom our fellow citis as had left to fight him would have rotted in jails or been murdered by gangs of criminals released or relieved from jail and directed by this awfully malicious criminal Judge."

Mrs. Carlisle tells a good story of one reception she had two winters ago, when, as the visitors kept coming in and none were leaving, even the halls were crowded. Senator Sherman was among the callers at this juncture. He got inside the door, and then finding that his progress toward his hostess was likely to be very slow, went part of the way up the stairs, and there he could be seen over every one's head, said in a loud voice: "Good afternoon, Mrs. Carlisle. I want to put it on record that I did call this afternoon and to say how sorry I am that I cannot get any nearer."

Ladies of Birmingham, daughters of Confederate soldiers, are taking active steps looking to the formation of an organization to be known as the "Daughters of the Confederacy," by which they will be able to give practical organized assistance to the Confederate Veterans in entertaining the large number of old soldiers who will gather at that city the third week in July. The painters are now at work on the "Winnie Davis Wigwam," in 1st avenue, and the prospects are bright for the greatest reunion of Confederate survivors since the unveiling of the Lee monument in Richmond.

The fleet of steamers which left New York for Europe recently carried about two thousand cabin passengers, which is fully up to the usual number of tourists starting at this season of the year. During the month of May, 1893, the number of cabin passengers between New York and European ports was 13,588. Of these 8,625 were east-bound and 4,963 west bound. In May, 1893, the total number of cabin passengers was 12,984—6,164 east-bound and 6,820 west-bound. This would indicate that only 1,857 Europeans came over in May to visit the Fair, and that the Fair or financial stringency, or some other cause, kept 2,461 Americans at home in May.

An experiment in "telegaphy," which is extremely interesting and would furnish a great deal of amusement at an evening entertainment, may easily be tried by a number of persons. One of the party is blindfolded and the others form a circle around him, in which all stand with their hands joined. A card is selected from a pack and placed where it may plainly be seen by all but the person blindfolded. He is expected to maintain a perfectly passive state, while the attention of the others is fixed exclusively on the card. After a time the image of the object on the card is "suggested to the mind" and named. In one instance where this experiment was tried the ten of diamonds was the card selected, and the blindfolded person, being ignorant of the object, decided upon, described ten real diamonds that he saw arranged as they would be upon the card. In blindfolding the light may be entirely shut out from the eyes by folding kid gloves into pads to lay over them and binding with a handkerchief.
