The Rev. Dr. Lafferty in a lecture at New Orleans said that at Shiloh it Albert Sidney Johnston had lived thirty minutes longer Gen. Grant would have surrendered. A bullet sped in the dusk of the evening struck down the champion of the South, and at the same time struck a mortal blow to the cause of the Confederacy. The battle of Sharpsburg turned on the loss of a dispatch by Gen. Lee, which was found by Mc-Ciellan.

Dr. George F. Sheedy, in an arti cle on "Américan Achievements in Surgery" in the April Forum, says that Ephraim M Dowell, a Kentucky surgeon, was the man who first dared to invade the region of the bowels with a knife, and that to Dr. J. Marion Sims, a Southern surgeon, is due the establishment of a new school in gynaeology; which is now admitted to be a true American invention. Sims' name i- associated with more new instruments and original operations than any other of his countrymen.

The diocese of New Orleans contains probably 100,000 colored Catholies, a larger number than any other in the country. A serious schism is expected; growing out of the color question. No race lines whatever have been drawn in the past, and whites and blacks attend the same churches, the Catholic Church be ing the only one where the two races worship together. In some of the churches, especially the St. Louis Cathedral, the colored people constitute a large portion if not a majority of the congregations. For some time past there has been a disposition on the part of the whites to secure a sepa ation of races, but to this the negroes strongly objected. Two years ago the Redemptorists, who have already erected an edifice for the Germans and French, proposed to build a special church for the negroes, but they abandon-

ed the idea when they found how unpopular it was with the colored race. Archbishop Jausseur, however, has taken up the project again and proposes to carry it out whatever the negroes may think of it.
