Audit and Finance.

The Board of Audit and Finance met yesterday afternoon. Present: Messrs. R. J. Jones, (chairman,) C. H. Gauzer, J. W. Hewett, Wm. Calder and H. C. McQueen.

The action of the Board of Aldermen in appropriating \$100 per annum for feeding a horse for the superintendent of streets was disapproved.

Bill of J. H. McRee, city surveyor, was referred to the Streets and Wharves committee of the Board of Aldermen for separation of items.

Bills for current expenses amounting to \$1,112.45 were audited and approved.

The amendment to the Tax Ordinance, introduced by the Board of Aldermen, striking out the license tax on blacksmiths, horseshoers, tinners, shoemakers, carpenters, painters, tailors, gunsmiths, dentists, upholsterers, and paper-hangers, was disapproved.

Other amendments were under consideration, when, on motion, further action was deferred to give time for consultation with the City Attorney, and the Board then took a recess until Thursday, May 31st, at 3:30 o'clock p. m.

The Hemenway School.

The closing exercises of the Hemenway School were held last night, and the large room was thronged by those who had assembled there. Among those present were Mr. H. A. Bagz, chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, and Messrs. Jas. F. Post, Jr., Jas. H. Chadbourne and W. H. Sprunt, of School Committees Nos. 1, 2 and 3. A delightful programme was presented and the young folks all acquitted themselves handsomely. Miss Bessie Burt, the pianist, was presented by Mr. Bagz with a handsome gold ring, and that gentleman took advantage of the opportunity to thank those present for the great interest they manifested in the cause of education. At the close of the exercises Prof. Noble spoke of the work done in the Hemenway school during the year there have been enrolled 456 pupils, of whom 227 were males and 229 were females. He said that was a good showing and he was very proud of it and knew the people were also proud of it. He expressed his pride both of this and the Union school, and remarked that probably New Hanover was the only county in the State that furnished its city with schools. This was a plain and unmistakable evidence of an excellent and progressive county government.
