> The question of the registration of voters is the all-absorbing topic in Hawaii at the present time, in view of the elections which are to take place. The registration closed on the 21st of last month, and in Honolulu 1,507 have signed the rolls At the last election-under the royal regiment there were only 2,800 v ters. Only 185 natives have taken the oath of allegiance to the Provisional Government. The follow ing is the classification of the new registration: Native, 185; Hawaiian born, foreign, 103; American, 290; English, 195; German, 120; Portuguese, 418; all others, 98; total 1,507. A large number of American citizens have not registered, as they fear they will lose their American citizenship by taking the required
