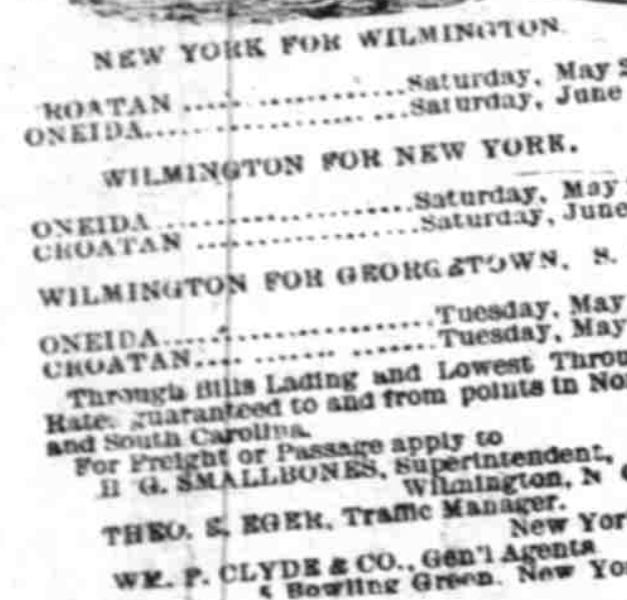

Synopsis of the Weather. The following is a synopsis of the weather for the 24 hours ending at eight o'clock to-day, prepared by the U. S. Weather Bureau:

The storm in the southwest has apparently moved very rapidly to the northeast, joining with the low from the north, the combined storm being central this morning off the Atlantic and Southern New Jersey coast. This leaves the pressure relatively low east of the Mississippi, with slowly increasing barometer to the westward. Generally fair weather prevails, except in the north and the lower Mississippi valley.

Rain fell pretty generally throughout the country, being heaviest in the Atlantic and Southern States. The temperature has fallen slightly in New England and in this immediate vicinity, with only slight changes in other sections. The weather in the cotton belt remains moderately cool with copious showers in all districts.

DOG ORDINANCE.

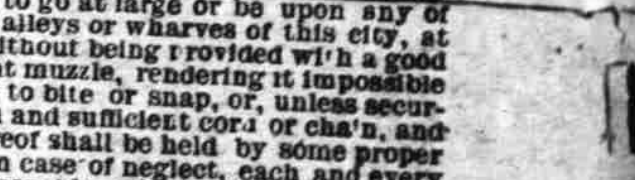
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD of Aldermen of the City of Wilmington, N. C., as follows: Article I.—Animals. SECTION 1.—Dog Ordinance.

SECTION 1. Every owner or keeper of a dog shall annually, on or before the 10th day of June, cause it to be registered, numbered, described and licensed, in the office of the Clerk and Treasurer, and shall cause it to wear at all times around its neck, a collar distinctly marked with the registered number and year license, for a male dog one dollar, and for a female dog three dollars. All dogs running at large without such collar, and all dogs not registered, numbered, described and licensed as aforesaid, shall be killed, and every owner or keeper of a dog who shall violate any of the provisions of the first section of this ordinance shall be fined twenty-five dollars.

SECTION 2. No dog to go at large or be upon any of the streets, alleys or walks of this city, at any time, without being provided with a collar, and sufficient muzzle, rendering it impossible for such dog to bite or snap, or, unless secured by a good and sufficient collar, or collar and muzzle, shall be held by some responsible person, or, in case of neglect, each and every dog shall be considered as being a stray dog, and shall be killed, and also in any case when above mentioned, shall die any person, the owner or keeper of a dog who shall neglect or violate any of the provisions of Section Two of this Ordinance shall be fined twenty-five dollars for each and every offence.
