"Near by are the classic grounds of old Guilford Courthouse, memorable in the history of the revolution of 1776. 'Twas here also that General Johnston, in May, '65, surrendered the last hope of the Confederacy. Many sad sto-ries are told of that gallant old army of the West, after Roway County -(Sont to Lube Plant having marched from the banks of the Mississippi, fighting desperate odds inch by inch till it reached Greensboro'. Nearly all the young men from this part of North Carolina were in the army of Northern Virginia, and Greensboro'. like all other Southern towns, exhibits the sad spectacle in its streets of many of its best citizens maimed for life. Guilford county, though one of the most unconquerable Union counties in the State, when the tocsin of war sounded was found among the foremost. From Williamsburg to Gettysburg the bones of her sons attest her devotion to principle. Since the close of the war, her people, thoroughly loyal and honest, have accepted the decision of fate, and gone to work with a will that must be crowned with success.
